

Turkey Industry Aid Tops Work of Roseburg C. of C.

Recent activities of the Roseburg chamber of commerce and plans for the ensuing few weeks are outlined in the monthly bulletin issued to members today by W. C. Harding, secretary. The bulletin follows:

Some six weeks ago we were apprised of the fact that sixty million pounds of turkey was in cold storage plants, threatening ruin to that industry this fall. Your chamber of commerce officers and directors immediately set national machinery in motion to counteract the threat, and we now have the assurance from authoritative sources that the surplus will be consumed by fall. This changed condition should mean \$100,000 to Douglas county turkey raisers alone. We regard this as the most outstanding constructive accomplishment of this organization so far this year.

June will be a very active month for Roseburg and vicinity. Tuesday, June 4, leaving Roseburg at 1:30 p. m., a large caravan of our people will make a courtesy call upon our Reedsport and Gardiner neighbors. Brief stops will be made at cities along the route. At 6:45 o'clock, dinner will be enjoyed at Reedsport, followed by a short, snappy program. This arrangement will bring us back home by eleven o'clock. A state patrol officer will be in charge of the caravan.

The annual salmon bake, under auspices of the Roseburg Rod and Gun club, Harris Ellsworth, president, will be held at Umpqua park Sunday, June 16. This event will be attended by 100 members of V. P. W., who are holding a divisional meeting here on that day.

The state convention of Disabled American Veterans will be held in Roseburg, commencing with church services, Sunday, June 9, and carrying through Wednesday, June 12. Two hundred and fifty delegates are expected. Friday morning, 8:30 o'clock, June 21, a large caravan led by a state traffic officer, will drive up the North Umpqua to Diamond Lake to formally open this new road to general traffic. The road will be perfectly safe and will soon become a real asset, not only to Douglas county, but to the state of Oregon.

The state fire chiefs' annual convention will be held here Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, June 24 to 26, inclusive. Two hundred and fifty delegates are expected. This will be a splendid educational event for our people.

As Walter Lippman suggests: "There can be no security nor liberty without discipline." Because of our anarchy and play boy indifference of the past 20 years, and our criminal neglect of the basic principles of preparedness for national defense against foreign militaristic wolves running wild, we are now brought face to face with the very evident fact that we will pay the bill for our 20-year joyride in a forced discipline and economy, absolutely necessary to our continued existence as a nation of free people.

As we see the picture, your chamber of commerce is now of greater value than ever before as a clearing house and fact finding body for the many vexing problems that will rapidly come before us for determination.

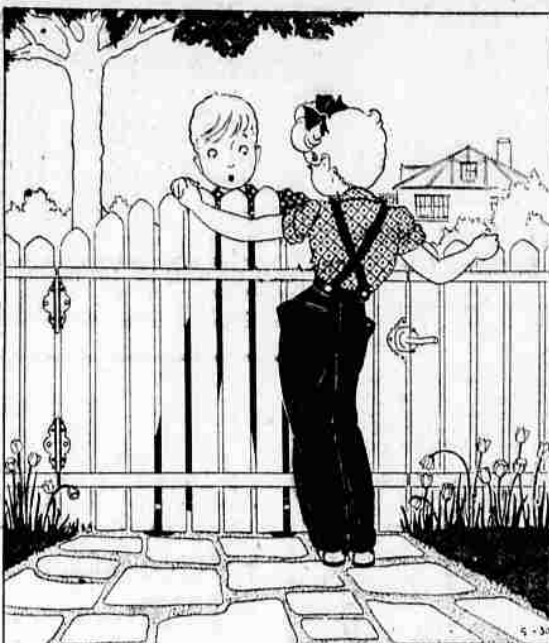

Day Resigns As Judge in Jackson

Future Time to be Devoted to Tax Matters; J. B. Coleman Appointed as Successor.

SALEM, May 25.—(AP)—County Judge Earl B. Day of Jackson county resigned today and Gov. Charles A. Sprague appointed J. B. Coleman, Jackson county assessor, to serve the remainder of Day's term which ends next January.

Day was not a candidate for re-election, Coleman receiving the nomination. If Coleman wins in the general election next November, he thus would succeed himself.

Judge Day, explaining he wants to devote his full time to "obtaining contributions to counties in lieu of taxes on federally-owned income-producing land which I believe to be vitally necessary to the taxpayers of Oregon," wrote the governor:

"I believe my work in preparing essential information for the Oregon counties on the federal contribution question is of far more importance than continuing my work as county judge for the balance of the year."

It was assumed he would work for the association of Oregon county officers in behalf of legislation, introduced by members of Oregon's congressional delegation, to require the federal government to pay taxes on its income-producing forest lands.

Day was appointed to the judgeship in June, 1933, by former Governor Julius L. Meier, to fill the vacancy caused by the conviction of Earl H. Fehl, of ballot-theft conspiracy.

During his tenure of office, Judge Day was the founder of the League of Oregon Counties.
