The four front teams are so close together that Seattle completes top spot with less games won than the three trailing teams.

San Diego, in second place, is just one percentage point ahead of Oakland and Hollywood, sharing third spot one game behind the leader.

The third place clubs both won their games yesterday to step on the heels of the San Diego Padres who lost to Los Angeles 12 to 7. Los Angeles batters chased Herb of San Diego to the showers in the fourth and continued to hit three other Padres pitchers for a total of 16 bingles.

Hollywood moved forward in the race by taking its second straight victory over the leading Seattle Rainiers, 7 to 1. Hollywood smashed out 10 hits while its pitcher, Lattner, held the Rainiers to four.

Oakland remained in a tie with Hollywood for the sixth successive day by doubling Portland 5 to 3. Four runs in the second inning broke a 1 to 1 knot and gave Oakland its victory over the longhairs' last place team. Harrell was on the mound for the losers.

The daughter of a Greek immigrant who developed a chain of movie theaters in New York, New Jersey and Connecticut, she said she had married George McMillan of Knoxville, Tenn., in New York.

Sister D. Coralia, who died on April 22, 1939, left \$25,000 in her will that Virginia could receive \$25,000 if she married a person born in the Greek orthodox faith and a member of the church at the time of the marriage. That was the sole condition of the daughter, a Wellesley graduate in the class of 1937.

McMillan, of English descent, is an international writer in the food stamp plan office in Washington.

Coralia's widow approved her daughter's action.

"Virginia and George are in love and that's all that counts," she said.

The entire estate will go to three brothers in 1959.

Roseburg Income Tax Payers Placed at 364

WASHINGTON, May 29.—(AP)—The treasury announced today that 34,765 individual income tax returns were filed in Oregon in 1939.

There were 6,250,795 individual returns filed that year, the treasury said, compared with 6,398,544 in 1938. In making public the number of returns by states, counties, cities and towns with a population of 1,000 or more, the treasury did not disclose the amount of tax paid.

The omission of certain localities of 1,000 population or larger, the treasury said, was attributable to the fact that an individual might file his return in the collection district of which he was a resident, or in which his principal place of business was located.

The number of returns by counties, cities and towns in Oregon included:

Walters Posts 8th Straight Triumph

Blanking of Pittsburgh Raises Cincinnati to Virtual Tie With Dodgers for Lead.

This triumph raised the Reds again into a virtual tie with Brooklyn for the national league lead. The Dodgers, whose small percentage margin stems from the fact they have played fewer games, were idle yesterday along with the New York Giants.

The day was a good one for pitchers, ten of them going the route in seven games, and three

Chub Minnow Use For Bait Decried

Fishermen carrying chub minnows for use as bait in lakes of Oregon planted exclusively to trout are not only violating the law but, perhaps unknowingly, aiding a definite threat to trout life of these lakes, according to officials of the Oregon State Game commission.

Chubs are of a cannibalistic type and therefore prey on other fish, destroying them in large numbers. During recent years numerous fishermen have carried chub minnows three-inn butter and Catcher Owen batted in four runs with two doubles.

Under provisions of the game code, it is unlawful to fish with minnows in any waters other than those from which the minnows come. All sportsmen are urged to cooperate with the game commission in preventing the use of chub minnows in exclusive trout lakes.
