Expert Features Dishes Designed To Please Males

The men had their lining today as the News-Review cooking school came to a close. Miss Barbara Miller, culinary expert, conducting the school and demonstrating her "Happy Kitchen," today devoted her instructions principally to the boiled, broiled and sautéed dishes which delight the male palate. Preparation of meats, cheese, roll, etc., formed the main topic for today's school, which was well attended.

The closing session was marked by the distribution of many valuable gifts to the housewives present.

Among the new recipes presented today were the following:

Porter-Frit-Lets Con Carne
1 lb. link sausage or lamb stew meat
1 tsp. minced garlic
1 cup minced onion
2 cups tomatoes
2 tsp. salt
Dash of black pepper
1 tsp. chili powder
2 cups lima beans
1 small package Frit-Lets uncooked

1 tsp. olive oil
1 tsp. butter
Method: Sauté meat until golden brown. Add Frit-Lets seasonings and vegetables. Bring to boiling point, then simmer slowly for 1 hour.

Macar Cheese Rolls
Remove yeast dough from refrigerator. Press on floured board and roll out to 1/4 inch thick. Cut with large cookie cutter and place small piece of cheese in center. Fold dough into ball. Place in greased pan and let rise until double. About 10 minutes in warm place. Bake in medium hot oven of 400 degrees for about 20 minutes or until nicely browned.

Gutierrez Chocolate Cup Cakes
1 cup Crisco
2/3 cup White Satin sugar
1 egg well beaten
1 cup Borden milk
11 cups Umpqua Chief flour
2 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. salt
1 cup chocolate

Method: Blend Crisco and sugar. Add beaten egg. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with the milk to which the vanilla has been added. Bake in greased gem pans in moderate oven of 325 degrees for 18 to 20 minutes. Frost with whipped cream.

Sweet Pastry Tarts
11 cups Umpqua Chief flour
1 tsp. salt
1 tsp. baking powder
1 cup Crisco
3 cup White Satin sugar
Cold water

Method: Sift flour, salt, sugar and baking powder. Cut in Crisco with pastry blender. Add just enough cold water to hold dough together. Roll out to 1/8 inch thick. Cut with doughnut cutter. Bake in hot oven of 450 degrees for about 10 to 12 minutes. Cool.

Super Air Force Huge Undertaking

Roosevelt's Plans Would Need Larger Personnel Than Existing American Army.

WASHINGTON—If an air force of 50,000 planes, as suggested by President Roosevelt in his special message to congress, should become a reality, it would automatically require the raising, training and equipment of a force of men far larger than the entire peace-time strength of the existing American army.

To begin with, there would have to be a huge force of trained pilots, going by current practices in the army and navy, at least two pilots per plane. A number of these, in peace-time, would be in the reserve; nevertheless, they would have to be trained and would have to spend part of their time each year on duty.

Next there would be needed a very greatly augmented ground force.

Simply to care for the planes requires today approximately 10 men per plane. These include the mechanics who wheel the plane out, the guards at the hangars, of free staff, and so on. This portion would diminish at the number of planes increased; experts here suggest that with 50,000 planes it could be cut to a five-to-one ratio, or a total ground force of 250,000 men.

But that does not constitute all of the ground forces needed to keep the air fleet in fighting trim. An elaborate supply corps would have to be built up. Estimating its size is pure guesswork; one guess, offered by an officer who is in a good position to judge, is that the supply corps would have to be between 200,000 and 250,000 men.

Trying to figure out the numbers of different types of ships that should be built is difficult until it is known how the total force would be divided between the army and navy. Whatever the proportion, it is pretty certain at least 12,500 planes would be trained.

On the assumption that the whole force might be army planes, it could be guessed that some 5,000 would be heavy bombers, around 17,500 would be pursuit planes, and 15,000 would be more or less evenly divided into observation planes, light bombers and transport planes. It might also be figured that probably 10,000 planes, or 25 per cent of all the planes outside of the trainer class, would be put in reserve.

Organized navy style, approximately one-third of the total number would be long-distance bombers of the flying-boat type. Perhaps half that many would be seaplanes of the kind carried on cruisers and battleships; the balance would be land-type fighters and light bombers.

Would Cut Anti-Aircraft Needs
In one branch of the service the raising of a 50,000-plane air force would make possible a proportionate reduction in anti-aircraft defense.

Anti-aircraft units are not fixed in proportion to a country's own air service, but are, theoretically, geared to the air force of possible rivals. As one's own air force is strengthened, one's anti-aircraft force can be diminished. In theory, a nation possessing 50,000 war planes could reduce its anti-aircraft force to a bare minimum.

There could be no real reduction in the U. S. army, however, because its anti-aircraft strength

today is negligible. An excellent authority states that all the anti-aircraft units in the U. S. army put together would not be sufficient to protect New York City alone from attack. Whatever happens to the U. S. air force, then, the anti-aircraft defense is going to be strengthened.

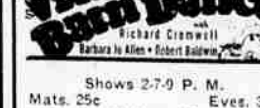
