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Every state, county and city
official or board that handles
public money should publish at
regular intervals an accounting
of it, showing where and how
each dollar is spent. This is a
fundamental principle of demo-
cratic government.

IN THESE days of horror, a great
deal of it resulting from traitor-
ous action of those who are now
called "fifth columnists," why
should we continue to deal kindly
with alien agitators? Shielded by
an officer in the cabinet of our
government, an act of congress is
now required to remove Australian
Harry Bridges from his job as
trouble maker in this country and
send him back to his native soil.

This much is certain, however,
now that it is started, the move to
deport Bridges by an act of con-
gress must not fail. For the con-
gress to reject this bill would be
equivalent to giving the Pacific
coast waterfront mischief-maker a
vote of confidence.

A democracy is a kindly form of
government. It suffers ingratitude,
abuse and often attack from those
who do not appreciate its bless-
ings. It seldom imposes punish-
ment for such things. The general
philosophy behind this seeming
negligence is fairness and forgive-
ness. Such governments are hope-
lessly awkward and inefficient
about arming and whipping up
war spirit for aggression. But they
are nevertheless deadly enemies
when compelled to defend them-
selves or a wronged neighbor. We
have not shot or jailed the num-
erous agitators of the Bridges ilk—
though in a dictatorship such
would have been their fate even be-
fore their names became known to
more than the secret police. Rather,
we have suffered them to proceed
knowing that our liberty is too se-
cure to be endangered seriously by
such activities—at least that has
been true up to the present.

But within the year we have
seen other trusting governments
destroyed and their free people
placed under the yoke of Nazi
might—perhaps for generations to
come.

It seems we are now at the point
of fighting to defend our free in-
stitutions from the despicable efforts
of the hordes of predatory rulers.
We are aroused.

In our enthusiasm we will doubt-
less begin to see a fifth columnist
behind every tree and rock ledge.
This may become a problem—but
better that sort of thing for a while
than a complacency that will breed
nothing but horrible trouble later.
It is time to smoke the moccasins
out and run them out.

Allies Undaunted By Flanders Rout

Determination to Keep Up War Seen in Late Dispatches; Italy Now Chief Danger.

If you would have a concrete il-
lustration of whether the Anglo-
French determination to prosecute
the war has been weakened by ad-
versity in the battle of Flanders,
it is to be had in two brief sen-
tences taken from different parts
of the A. P. report dated Paris—
Paris—A second British expedi-
tionary force has arrived in
France, it was announced yester-
day, to take over the Somme salient.

Berlin—Meanwhile the great and
bloody fighting attending the al-
lied evacuation from Flanders,
chiefly through the port of Dun-
kerque, continued with unabated
fury.

So the war is going on. Fland-
ers or no Flanders, and let no
one doubt the magnitude of the
stake. It is nothing less than to
determine whether empires shall
survive.

In any event, the jubilant Hitler
is busy with plans for following up
his great initial success. And the
allies have turned grim faces
straight toward the storm.

There are several directions in
which Hitler might strike—against
England direct, against the heart
of France, or even in the Balkans
—but as usual he is keeping his
own counsel and there is no clear
indication of his intentions.

Italy Now Chief Danger.

Perhaps the greatest immediate
danger which could beset the al-
lies would be an onslaught by Italy
against France while they are
weakened and considerably disor-
ganized as a result of the defeat
in Flanders.

Hitler and Nazi Propaganda Min-
ister Goebbels have been reported
conferring at Hitler's headquarters
been specially summoned. One
usually well-informed Berlin quar-
ter said they were preparing to
proclaim Italy's role in the war.

Informed London observers said
they expected Hitler to divide the
allies by separate offers of peace,
and to thrust the Italian entrance
into the war to force acceptance.

Vital "ifs" Presented.

However that may be, the allies
certainly have plenty of reason to
believe that Mussolini may be get-
ting ready to take some sort of
hand in the bloody game. Whether
the British and French could shoul-
der that extra weight is, of course,
a matter for trial, but is of course
doubt that they would give an ex-
cellent account of themselves. I
think we might go a step further
and put it this way:

If the allies can hold the battle-
line in hand from now on for a
brief space, time will be playing
in their favor and it's a fair gamble
that they would indeed be able to
handle an additional enemy.

We shall know a lot more about
the prospects when we learn how
badly the Germans have suffered by
the blitzkrieg thus far. Their casu-
alties and consumption and loss of
materials undoubtedly have been
staggering.
