Lawns Need Early Care for Summer

Lawns are subjected to the greatest use and abuse during the summer and fall. Constant trampling causes little injury to the grass itself, but so compacts the sod as to make it quite impervious to moisture, and smother its vital bacteria.

Close inspection of the average lawn reveals that the crowns of the individual grass plants are practically standing above the soil level. Inasmuch as grass plants should develop laterally by an increase of the crown diameter, most of the new spring growth will dry and will before reaching maturity.

Thorough weeding is important. The small weeded areas should be cultivated thoroughly, enriched with wood-free plant food, and reseeded. One should always replace weeds with grass seed for this spots after space for weeds to be come established.

Cover With Loam... A top dressing of friable loam, containing wood-free, organic plant food, peat, and powdered charcoal, should be applied to the lawn after cutting.

Red Cross Pleads For More Funds

An appeal for immediate voluntary contributions to the Red Cross war relief fund was made today by Mrs. Ellen Post, executive secretary of the Douglas county chapter, who reported that the chapter still is far short of its minimum quota of \$1,000 and at the same time is being pressed to double that amount.

A telegram received from national headquarters reads as follows: "When the American Red Cross asked a minimum war relief fund of ten million dollars no one could foresee that in two short weeks the greatest tragedy in all history would be unfolded. It is impossible to describe the pitiful plight of millions of refugees in France.

The sick, wounded, hungry and homeless cry out to us for help. We will need more than ten million dollars. Therefore, quotas originally assigned should be regarded only as minimum, immediate objectives. Chapters should then go on and, where possible, double their quotas.

Mrs. Post urges that Douglas county residents make voluntary contributions immediately. Money may be left at any newspaper office in the county, or with E. S. McClain at the Roseburg branch of the U. S. National bank or may be mailed to chapter headquarters at the courthouse in Roseburg.

Seattle Outhit But Beats Hollywood

(By the Associated Press) Seattle's seat at the head of the Pacific Coast baseball league parade was a bit more secure today in further proof that while home hits help a lot in the game, the payoff is made strictly on the basis of runs across the plate. The Hollywood Stars garnered 12 hits while the Rainiers were collecting only 9 in their game last night, but Seattle won the contest, 6-2. The Stars loaded the bases five times in four innings, but failure to hit at the critical moments resulted in 18 players being stranded on the pads. Tate, Seattle right hander, twice fanned a batter for the third out when the bases were full. The league's second place Oakland Oaks punched the cellar-dwelling Portland Beavers groggy with 23 hits and an 18-2 victory. Los Angeles overcame San Diego's 5-1 lead in the seventh inning with a four-run rally which gave the Angels the game, 8-5. Sacramento nosed out San Francisco, 4-3.
