

Labor Advised To Be Loyal to U. S.

Be Sparring of Strikes, Abide by Laws, Arbitrator Morse Tells Marine Federation.

ASTORIA, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—Dean Wayne L. Morse, Pacific coast waterfront arbitrator, told the Maritime Federation of the Pacific convention yesterday that labor could be a good patriot without surrendering its legitimate rights.

He warned the marine workers' delegates, however, that there were forces which could destroy labor's "hard won rights" under the guise of "national emergency."

To combat them he advised labor use the weapon of strike sparingly and obey the laws and the constitution assiduously, even when it hurt.

"If congress passes an act deserting Harry Bridges (west coast longshore and C.I.O. leader), there is nothing to do but obey it," he said. "The legal institutions must be preserved."

Labor's strength, he asserted, lies in the wise use of the implements in its hands. Public favor will be won through recourse to peaceful methods of settling disputes and a recourse to strike only as the final expedient.

"There will be circumstances justifying strikes," he continued. "The application of economic force may be necessary to shock the public into a realization of true conditions. But wise labor will exhaust every peaceful method first."

He counseled labor to hitch up its belt and face the threat of war. "If this nation goes to war—and it may within 12 months—union leaders and union men must give loyal, patriotic service as in the past," but he also said that labor could continue to fight for its own fair ends while fighting the nation's battles.

He declared that labor gains an embodiment in the national labor relations and wage hour acts should be protected from those who would "capitalize on a literary public" and who would overthrow them in the name of patriotism.

Commenting on suggestions that communists aid allies he barred from employment in interstate commerce, Morse said these elements "may have to get used to restricted civil liberties unless they conduct themselves in conformance with the American system."

Wool Growers Will Be Aided by Defense Needs

WASHINGTON, June 4.—(AP)—Senator Schwartz, democrat of Wyoming, said the war department had informed him approximately 42,000,000 pounds of uncleaned wool would be consumed under requirements of the new defense program.

Schwartz said this should be "further encouraging news" for the nation's wool growers.

Today he was told by the war department, he said, that the quartermaster corps' new requirements would be approximately 5,000,000 yards of serge cloth, 4,000,000 yards of flannel, one and a half million yards of worsted or flannel shirting, and half a million shirts.

Shortage of Barrels for Berries Laid to Strikes

PORTLAND, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—Northwest strawberry growers who didn't have enough hands to pick their berries last month, didn't have enough barrels to put them in today.

The huge Gresham Berry growers' association, which employs 600 processors and 7000 pickers, declared it had faced a possible harvest.

Savant Warns On Witch Hunt Orgy

CHICAGO, June 5.—(AP)—A college psychologist asserted yesterday that anti-fifth column activities in the United States might result in the establishment of concentration camps.

The psychologist, Dr. Robert N. McMurtry of the Chicago Central Y. M. C. A. college, said in an interview that such activities could assume the proportions of "national hysteria."

"I venture the prediction," he said, "that before this hysteria runs its course you are likely to see the worst witch hunt in American history—and possibly the establishment of concentration camps."

"It is not a matter of intelligence. It is a matter of people letting their emotions get so much control they can do anything about it. In an hysteria the veneer of civilization is stripped off and when all of the public's sadistic tendencies come to the fore."

"Reason is stopped. Logic goes down the rat hole."

Dr. McMurtry said fifth columnists should be curbed but that it should be done by the federal bureau of investigation or "other constituted authorities," and not by "self-constituted groups or individuals."

"The probability," he said, "is that the hysteria is going to run wild. Everybody is going to see a fifth columnist under every bed."

on the diplomatic front was reported meanwhile in London, where Soviet Russian circles indicated there was a good possibility of cooperation between the Russian krenin and the allies in the black sea and the eastern Mediterranean.

It was a new bond of Anglo-Russian friendship might easily counter the pressure of Italy in the Mediterranean.

With Belgium crushed in a 26-day campaign, Hitler sent his legions striking into the heart of France with a hint that he had offered the allies some kind of peace terms—possibly a separate peace to only one side—and had been rejected.

This, in his "order of the day" addressed to his armies, the Fuehrer declared:

"The plutocratic rulers of England and France, who pledged each other to avoid with all means the outbreak of a new and better world, want a continuation of the war."

London several days ago reported that Hitler was expected to offer a separate peace in an attempt to split the allies—and Prime Minister Churchill pledged yesterday that Britain would fight "alone if necessary" to win the war.

Allied Planes Score

Allied planes again retaliated for the Nazi aerial attack on Paris—which left 254 dead and 652 wounded—by bombing Friedrichshafen, home of the German Zeppelin and site of Nazi airplane engine factories.

The news that the Nazi legions had struck anew was announced to the German people by Adolf Hitler in a special message, in which he said his armies were again on the march "to fight for continuation of the liberty and future of our people."

At the same time Hitler decreed a national celebration of eight days for the German victory in Flanders.

London military circles estimated total German casualties to date since Hitler's offensive action began against the low countries and France at between 400,000 and 500,000, out of roughly 2,500,000 men engaged.

Germany used about eighty divisions, ten of them armored and five motorized, a spokesman said. The armored divisions were estimated to have lost from one-third to one-half their strength.

Tension was reported growing between Greece and Turkey as a result of the supposed demands.

About 20 British, mostly members of the embassy's commercial staff in Rome, and their families left today for home. Fellow countrymen who had been far away from the station shouted "hurray" for England! as the train departed.

The government issued instructions for blackouts in case of air raids.

Rank and file Italians, admitting privately that the on-and-off state of Italy's war preparations was getting on their nerves, took the view that "if we're going to fight, let's get it over with."

Committee Chairman Doughton (D. N. C.), applied the five-year provision to all its levies, which included many increases in excise taxes.

The original theory was that the tax increases would retire a \$2,000,000,000 or \$4,000,000,000 addition to the federal debt for defenses. The larger figure was definitely decided on by the committee yesterday.

Republicans were reported to be insisting on a general revision of the revenue laws, which would keep congress in session indefinitely.

All but one of the republican committeemen abstained from voting yesterday when the committee decided to recommend increasing the federal debt limit from \$45,000,000,000 to \$49,000,000,000 and to devise increases which would "at least" pay off this \$4,000,000,000 hoist in five years.

Afterward nine abstaining republicans issued a statement protesting that sufficient information was lacking as to how the money would be spent and as to whether the proposed new debt limit would "meet present conditions." They demanded a reduction in government expenses.

I think the people of the country will be interested in knowing that fact," Pepper declared.

He said it was his opinion that if the United States immediately made military equipment, including existing army and navy planes available to the allies, they could "save Paris and London."

A secret statement from the army high command on "fifth column" activities in several Latin American countries kept hemisphere defense problems to the fore in the crush of preparedness considerations.

There was added emphasis on the subject in the declaration of a cabinet member, Secretary Wallace, that "the dictator nations have definite designs" on the new world.

"If England and France are conquered," Wallace said in a speech last night, "the Americas will be the next objective."

Reasons for the army's manifest concern over the potentialities of conditions in some parts of the western hemisphere were outlined yesterday in a closed meeting of the house military committee by General George C. Marshall, chief of staff.

General Marshall, some members said later, named five countries in Latin America where he declared "fifth column" activities were cause for apprehension. An intensification of efforts might be expected, Marshall was quoted, if Great Britain and France appeared certain to be defeated.
