NAZI TALKS TRAPPED BY FRENCH DEFENSE

DEFENSE PLANS EMBRACE DRIVE ON FIFTH COLUMN

Restrictions Tightened On Aliens in U. S.

Force of FBI Agents Will be Increased; Congress Eyes Allies' Application to Purchase Surplus Arms.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—The government, striving for "total preparedness," synchronized its huge military program today with a comprehensive campaign against "fifth column" threats on the home front.

Urgent allied requests for arms—even left-over weapons of the world war—were also considered by a government intensifying its own national defense efforts.

While congress was being asked to authorize 400,000 regular troops—almost double the standing army's present strength—President Roosevelt requested \$6,258,800 to reinforce the federal bureau of investigation and other justice department units responsible for dealing with subversive activities.

Tighten Alien Control

The entry and travel of aliens were placed under drastic restrictions by state department order, which barred admission to the United States to all foreigners unable to prove a "legitimate purpose or reasonable need."

A ban was imposed simultaneously on shore-leave privileges for 24 foreign seamen whose names are not listed on the vessel crew roster of a ship making port.

Without debate, the house yesterday passed and sent to the senate a bill providing for prompt deportation of aliens engaged in espionage or sabotage for a foreign government or who have been convicted of a felony.

Secretary Morgenthau revealed that the allies are considering vast new purchases of military

Thefts Hold Youth In Douglas Jail

Pal Sought After Escaping at Coos Bay; Two Drain Stores Robbed, Automobiles Stolen.

Otis E. White, 18, Portland, was in custody here today charged with burglary of the H. A. Cool hardware store at Cottage Grove Monday night and drove to Drain, where they robbed the Red and White grocery store and the Cool hardware store. Lost, the officer said, included several guns, 5,000 rounds of ammunition, clothing, fishing tackle, groceries and candy.

White told the officers, Thornton said, that he and Craige drove to Winchester Bay, where they planned to take a boat to Coos Bay, believing that the two bodies of water were connected by an inland route. Learning of their mistake, they continued on to Coos Bay, where White told the officers they placed their loot in a row boat and rowed out to an anchored motor boat. Attempting to steal the motor boat, Thornton said, the boys ran the boat aground on a mud bank and while trying to work free were surprised by a coast guard patrol. Both leaped overboard. White, however, surrendered and was placed under arrest, being brought to the county jail at Roseburg.

Following Craige to have been drowned, the coast guard dragged the waters of Coos Bay Wednesday. Thornton said until tracks were discovered on the beach indicating that the youth had reached shore and made his escape.

The stolen automobile, belonging to Leslie Smith of Cottage Grove, and the bulk of the loot taken from the drain stores were recovered, Thornton reported.

Bid for Umpqua Dredging Under Federal Estimate

PORTLAND, June 6.—(AP)—The port of Astoria submitted a low bid of \$178,500 to the army engineers yesterday for dredging in the channel and turning basin of the Umpqua river. The government estimate was \$182,000.

Japanese Planes Bomb Points Near Chungking

CHUNGKING, China, June 6.—(AP)—Large squadrons of Japanese planes bombed points near Chungking today. Fifty-four planes attacked the Chungking-Chengtu highway, 10 miles west of this provisional Chinese capital. Chungking itself had a three-hour alarm.

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Enough Whisky for Four Years, Scotland Advises

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—Scotland passed word today that it had enough Scotch whisky in warehouses to supply the world for the next four years.

This news, relayed to the commerce department, said that Scotch whisky stocks were so large that despite higher production and shipping costs the export price of liquor had not been increased.

The report also stated that Scotland was amassing whisky particularly for the American market. Stocks of whisky already in warehouses were estimated at 132,000,000 imperial proof gallons.

New Tax Plan Gets "Little Fellow"

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—How would the proposed new income tax affect your tax payment?

The house tax subcommittee voted yesterday to lower exemptions from \$2,500 to \$2,000 for married persons or heads of families, and from \$1,000 to \$800 for single persons.

After you figured your regular tax, under the pending bill, you would add 10 per cent as a "super tax."

Here are some comparisons between present payments of typical wage-earners and the proposed taxes. They are based on the present 4 per cent normal tax, and subtract the 10 per cent deduction for earned income but not such permissible deductions as charity, bad debts, etc.

'Quicksand' System Halts Juggernaut; British, Germans Trade Aerial Blows

Nazis Bomb Coast in Hunt For Air Bases

Damage Dealt by Raiders Not of Importance; Royal Air Force Harasses Germans in Central France Battle.

LONDON, June 6.—(AP)—Trading aerial blows in unceasing warfare, Germany's air force today unleashed its most extensive bombing attack on England since the war began while British airmen were reported officially to have attacked German troops, supply bases and communications lines in raids extending from the battle zone in France to the industrially-important Ruhr valley in western Germany.

British airmen dropped high explosives and incendiary bombs in their sweep over a 270-mile stretch of English coastline early today and last night in apparent search for British airbases.

British airmen made aerial assaults on crowded German communications lines leading to the Somme river battlefield in new efforts to help their French allies halt the German drive on Paris.

Nazis Do Little Damage.

Apparently in an effort to destroy the airbases from which royal air force bombers have gone out to pound military objectives in the Ruhr and other Nazi industrial centers, the German raiders dropped high explosives and incendiary bombs all along. A stretch of coast from Yorkshire in north-east England, to Kent, south of the Thames where it winds from London to the sea.

In Kent, a woman, her 13-year-old son and a 3-year-old baby escaped by leaping over a flaming incendiary bomb which tore through the roof of their house.

Other incendiary bombs which fell in Kent started two fires on the roofs of buildings, which were quickly extinguished, while another burned out on the front lawn of a house.

Many bombs dropped in Essex fell near a boys' school, and an air force landing school and in gardens and fields, injuring no one, the British said.

British Bombers Score

While Britons with rifles and guns at hand stood constant watch at home against any attempted invasion, the air ministry reported that medium and heavy bombers of the royal air force "attacked enemy troop concentrations and harassed enemy movements behind the fighting front."

Other heavy bombers, the ministry added, "struck at junctions and marshalling yards west of the Ruhr while others attacks military objectives in Germany."

The raiding forays took a toll of six German planes, the ministry said, while one British plane was shot down and two are missing.

The British scored direct hits on

County Home to be Guarded From Fire

Many improvements to eliminate fire hazards at the county home are being made immediately by the county court. It was announced today. The court, following a recent grand jury report calling attention to the fire hazards, secured a survey through the state fire marshal's office and has obtained a number of recommendations which are to be immediately adopted. County Judge Morris Bowker reported.

Metal insulation will be provided in the furnace room, electric wiring will be modernized, with the elimination of all drop cords; a fire escape will be added on the east side of the building and additional water taps will be added for emergency fire use.

The grand jury in its recent report recommended construction of a new fireproof building, but until such time as the county finances will permit the need construction, every effort will be made to keep the present wooden building as safe as possible, Judge Bowker said.

In addition to the improvements to be made, the patients are being rearranged, so that all bedfast patients will be kept on the lower floor.

Italy Mines 12-Mile Strip Around Coast

ROME, June 6.—(AP)—Italian authorities are notifying the United States government that a 12-mile strip around the coast of Italy is being mined, an authoritative source reported today.

The informant said that the United States liner Washington would be safely conducted through the 12-mile danger belt into Naples where it is scheduled to dock June 10.

The bounding of the Italian coast and the coastline of parts of the empire with the danger zone was the newest major development in Italy's broadening preparations for entry into the European war.

While the Italian coast, Gayda, editor of Il Giornale d'Italia, came a threat of eventual European intervention in American affairs if the United States went to the aid of beleaguered Britain and France.

American intervention, Gayda wrote, would be an "ostentatious, rash taking of sides in favor of a small part against a greater part of Europe."

Regular steamship service between Malta, British Mediterranean base, and certain parts of the Italian island of Sicily such as Syracuse was suspended.

Burglary Charge Faced by Youth

Clarence Moore Sider, 20, Portland, accused of armed burglary and car theft, was held in custody here today in lieu of \$5000 bail, after announcing before justice of the peace R. W. Marsters today, the latter reported, his intention of pleading guilty in circuit court to the charges brought against him.

Sider, according to State Police man I. M. Wells, was surprised yesterday while in the act of burglarizing the Theodore Anderson residence at Sutherland and held Mrs. Anderson at the point of a gun while escaping in an automobile allegedly stolen at Eugene. Sutherland city police immediately furnished a description of the burglar and automobile and a radio broadcast from the state police station resulted in the arrest by a patrolman.

Sider told the local authorities, the officer said, that he was released last August from the state training school after serving a term for car theft and burglary at Portland.

Europe Gets \$4,000,000 in Month From Red Cross

PORTLAND, June 6.—(AP)—War-stricken Europe has received \$4,000,000 from the American Red Cross in the past month, A. L. Schafer of San Francisco said today.

Germany, Japan and Russia have refused assistance, the Pacific coast director of the Red Cross told an interviewer. He added that the Polish Red Cross was still a "going concern, adding 600,000 Polish refugees in the Balkan states.

Victory Hope Raised

In Paris tonight, Premier Reynaud told his countrymen that "hundreds and hundreds" of enemy tanks had been destroyed since the Germans started their new blitzkrieg at dawn yesterday, and he declared:

"There is now reason to hope for victory, despite the present grave news."

The premier declared that "the regime of oppression will disappear forever and that German dreams of control over Europe are going to disappear under French resistance."

"Germany accused us recently of being divided; but today France is calm and united."

"Every country in Europe today has one common interest, to avoid the control of Germany."

"France is looking forward to the reconstruction of Europe in which the order and safety of all peoples will be guaranteed. The other peoples of the world must understand soon—because our task is immense."

Hordes of German attacked violently at dawn today on the 200-mile western front. Berlin reported, and "thrust into the heart of France" in the great battle for Paris.

General Weygand's French high command denied any serious break through, admitting only slight strategic withdrawals from lines "too far out in front."

Paris Claims Heavy Losses Dealt Enemy's Equipment; Germans Say Ground Gained

Premier Reynaud, Assuming Increased Power, Tells France of Victory Hope on Basis of Stubborn Resistance of Nation's Forces; Battle Rages at One Point Within Sixty Miles of Paris.

Heavy losses of German tanks trapped in France's new "quicksand" defense system on the 200-mile western front were reported by the French today as the Nazi high command asserted its troops had won ground "everywhere" in a thrust to the southwest.

German leaders were said to envision the fall of Paris within 15 days.

The heaviest German attacks were reported striking out in the Abbeville region—presumably aimed at the capture of Le Havre, vital channel port linking France with England, in a wide-sweeping drive on Paris.

Paris reported 25 Nazi tanks were destroyed in one spot, at Chaumes, nine miles southwest of Peronne.

New French Strategy Gets Results

The New French strategy, it was said, permits Nazi "panzer" forces to filter through defense lines—without attempting to throw infantry into the path of the mechanized monsters.

Then, in an engulfing movement, the French lines quickly close behind the tanks to halt the follow-up rush of German infantry, while the tanks are met by point-blank fire from concealed nests of French 75-millimeter field guns.

Nazis reported the efficiency of new defense traps has already been proved.

The Germans were hurling six mechanized divisions (normally 500 tanks in each division) into the onslaught at Abbeville.

The German high command's official communique, hours late today and flavored with generalities instead of the usual chronicle of specific successes, said of the great battle merely:

"Our troops have won ground everywhere toward the southwest."

It said that 143 enemy planes had been destroyed—19 by machine-gun fire and others on the ground—and that the Nazi air force had bombed Cherbourg, port of call for trans-Atlantic liners in peace time.

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Heavy German artillery pounded the front lines in the Soissons-Laon sector—base for the shortest onslaught toward Paris, about 60 miles distant—and sent over quantities of smoke shells.

A British radio report said the German air force raided the French city of Rouen, 25 miles inland from Le Havre.

The raid caused little damage, the report said, and the Germans lost six planes.
