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aircraft in this country. The Anglo-French purchasing commission has completed its first \$1,000,000 plan buying program and has discussed with him the possibility of a new program, he said.

Arms Sale Gets O. K.

Morzenau also disclosed that the allies had asked permission to buy "surplus" world war armaments and he referred the purchasing agents to the war department.

Attorney General Jackson, it was learned, ruled that the sale of these weapons would not be in violation of the law.

Stocks of thousands of guns apparently were placed within reach of the allies—subject to war department and white house approval—by Jackson's ruling on the legality of sale.

The war department's surplus list includes about 100,000 Lee-Enfield rifles, out of approximately 1,800,000 of this world war model in storage, and about 70,000 machine guns, mostly to arm aircraft, of Vickers, Marlin and Lewis manufacture.

Also included were approximately 300 British model 75 millimeter field guns, 100 British six-inch guns, and more than 250 British eight-inch howitzers.

The weapons were described as "usable" though some are more than two decades old.

Lawyers Asked to Serve

PH Chief J. Edgar Hoover, anticipating that congress will increase his force from its present 1,000 agents to a record strength of 1,600, appealed to young lawyers to apply for service.

The FBI, informed quarters said, already has numerous investigations under way into charges of alien activity in widely scattered sections of the country.

The senate military committee studied proposals for creation of a "home defense corps" of a million men and a "national industrial defense corps," the latter to

guard against sabotage in key industries.

No Mass Drive Planned

Attorney General Jackson declared today that any inference that the justice department contemplated "a mass drive or wholesale arrests" in connection with the defense program was "wholly unwarranted."

"We do not anticipate any abnormal increase in the number of prisoners," Jackson told newsmen. "The statement of the budget bureau does not say that an increase is expected. The number of federal prisoners has been for years increasing steadily, and the statement points out the fact that a great number require handling."

"Any inference that we contemplate a mass drive or wholesale arrests because of the defense program is wholly unwarranted."

Some members of the appropriations committee commented privately that on the face of the budget bureau's letter "it looks like we are getting ready for war."

French Cabinet Shaken Up
Premier Paul Reynaud became France's one-man director of the war with lightning changes in his cabinet before dawn of the second day of the "battle for Paris."

Reynaud announced that he had assumed the important post of foreign minister, in addition to the premiership and war portfolio.

The 62-year-old premier reached a new peak in political strength, little more than two months after he had won a vote of confidence by a bare majority in the chamber of deputies.

Former Premier Edouard Daladier, who had been foreign minister and long had been a figure in previous cabinets, was dropped from the government, together with other holdovers from earlier regimes.

New cabinet appointments included: Paul Baudouin, secretary of the administrative staff of the economic warfare committee, and president of the bank of Indo-China, as assistant to Reynaud in the foreign ministry.

General Charles de Gaulle, promoted from colonel in the May 25 army housecleaning in which 15 of the nation's highest commanders were ousted, as chief assistant to Reynaud in the war ministry.

Minister of Labor Ernest Bevin announced sweeping measures for mobilization of labor to speed Britain's armaments drive. A new order, effective next Monday, bans strikes and lockouts.

Luxury Limits Ordered

The government today ordered restrictions on retailers' supplies of a wide range of goods classified as luxuries, including hosiery, pottery, glassware and cutlery.

The retail sales of goods to be controlled amounted in 1939 to about £250,000,000 (about \$800,000,000).

The order will restrict supplies during the next six months to one third of the value supplied in the corresponding period last year, the main purpose being to free labor and materials for war and export.

After six months the restriction will be three fourths of the quantity supplied in a like period the previous year.

Another order prohibited the supply of certain type machinery except under license unless for government departments.

Material Adapted for Road Surfacing Found

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The county court today announced tentative discovery of a large supply of exceptionally fine road surfacing material in a hillside adjoining the North Umpqua road between Honey creek and the "hog back." Samples of the material indicate it will be very satisfactory for road surfacing and an immediate exploration is to be made to determine the quantity, which, at present, seems to be quite large, according to County Roadmaster Floyd Frost. A road way approximately 300 feet in length is to be constructed at once to permit access to the property.

Reedport Man Sent to Prison on Morals Charge

Louis Frakes, 56, Reedport, recently sentenced in circuit court to two years in the state penitentiary after pleading guilty to a charge of assault with intent to commit rape, was taken to Salem today. He was delivered to penitentiary authorities by Sheriff Percy Webb.
