

GOP May Defer Alien Policy Plank

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—Several senate republicans suggested today that fast-moving developments in Europe make it advisable to defer writing a foreign policy plank at the national convention until the remainder of the platform has been drafted.

Most republicans, they said, were more or less agreed on a strong "keep out of war" and increased defense declaration.

But they contended that specific language covering, for example, American assistance to the allies or territorial limits of United States defense policies—if such angles are to be touched—must await conditions at the time the platform is ready for submission.

The platform committee, which will meet a week in advance of the June 24 convention to start preliminary discussions, is about three-fourths complete. Each state and territory will have one member.

Among those already selected for committee memberships are three senators—Lodge of Massachusetts, Townsend of Delaware, and Thomas of Idaho—and two former senators—Penner of Pennsylvania and Edge of New Jersey.

Thomas and Lodge said that a foreign policy declaration should be given most careful consideration in the light of events at convention time. Thomas added he was "very definitely opposed to being stampeded into war."

The platform committee is not the only one which will go to work early at Philadelphia. The convention arrangements committee was called yesterday to meet June 19 to hear contests over the seating of delegates.

They will be given full delegation contests involving four states and Alaska; also contests over delegates from one district each in four other states.

Roosevelt-Byrnes Ticked Mailed

WASHINGTON, June 6.—(AP)—A Democratic ticket of President Roosevelt and Senator Byrnes of South Carolina was being discussed throughout congressional circles today as a result of the two officials' weekend cruise down the Potomac.

Byrnes would say of the report only that "the president, at no time in my life, has ever discussed with me the vice presidential nomination on either the democratic or republican tickets."

Regarding the general situation, however, some of Byrnes' friends intimated that he had received virtual assurance that Mr. Roosevelt would accept a third term nomination.

It was said authoritatively on capitol hill that Byrnes indicated willingness to be the president's running mate, although he had declined only three weeks ago to let the South Carolina democratic convention endorse him for that post.

More than a majority of the national democratic delegates already are pledged or semi-pledged to support Mr. Roosevelt if he

wants renomination. The resolutions committee of the Connecticut democratic convention voted unanimously last night to recommend that the state's 16-vote delegation be committed to the chief executive.

The South Carolina senator has been mentioned as a possible choice for keynote speaker or permanent chairman of the democratic national convention at Chicago July 15.

France Decrees Death for Quartet of Spies

PARIS, June 6.—(AP)—Charles Julien Masson, former captain of the French air corps, and three other men were sentenced yesterday to death on charges of operating a spy ring that dealt with French aviation secrets.

The military court said it was due to Masson's activities before the war that the Germans were able to bomb French airports with comparative ease.

The others sentenced are Otto Hans Weill, German traveling man; Rene Splieth, and Raymond Verlauger, mechanic.

Masson's woman friend, Elaine Quesnaville, and Marcou Ro-raine Ramignon, an electrician, were sentenced to forced labor for life.

Pro-America Opposes National Guard Call

PORTLAND, June 5.—(AP)—Opposition to presidential authority over the national guard and reserve units, except after declaration of war, was voted yesterday by Oregon chapters of Pro-America, republican women's organization.

Pioneer Editor A. S. Bliton Dies

MEDFORD, June 5.—(AP)—Albert S. Bliton, 81, a pioneer southern Oregon editor and native of Clyde, N. Y., died at his home here Wednesday.

Mr. Bliton came to Medford in January, 1893, and founded the present Medford Mail-Tribune. Before coming to this city, Mr. Bliton published a weekly newspaper at Florence, Ore., for eighteen months. He also published a weekly at Wheatland, North Dakota, from whence he came to Oregon.

Mr. Bliton was formerly postmaster at Wheatland and later deputy United States land commissioner for Oregon.

In 1891, after twenty years continuous service with the California-Oregon Power company, Mr. Bliton was retired on a pension.

Besides his widow, he is survived by a son, Albert H. Bliton of Eugene, and two daughters, Mrs. Lorraine Thomas, Medford, and Mrs. Mildred B. Dodge, Yreka, Calif.

Power Dusters Bombard Cricketers With Poison
