

Conn Gets Verdict Over Lesnevich

DETROIT, June 6.—(AP)—Gus Lesnevich lost his chance to win the light-heavyweight boxing championship of the world last night, but he woke up today with the knowledge that the title will probably be his within a few days.

Billy Conn, the champion, rebuilt the blasted hopes of Lesnevich a few minutes after receiving the decision in a 15-round defense of his crown.

Lesnevich was in a shower cooling his tired body when Conn walked in.

"It was a nice fight, Billy," said Gus. "I have no alibi."

"Don't feel bad," answered Conn, "because the champion will be yours in a few days. This fight convinced me I can't take off weight any more and from now on I'm a heavyweight. You can beat the other light-heavyweights."

Conn, a notoriously slow starter, appeared to disadvantage in the early rounds and then closed in whirlwind style to win a unanimous decision.

Paychek Kayoed in 10th by Negro Lad

CHICAGO, June 6.—(AP)—Johnny Paychek at 25 is through with the club.

He decided today to hang up his boxing gloves following his tenth round knockout in the coliseum last night at the hands of Alvin Allen, a 19-year-old Chicago Negro boxer, heavy weight, just a year out of golden gloves amateur competition.

Paychek, a native Chicagoan transplanted to Des Moines, Iowa, for a pugilistic career, said he has lost all desire for boxing, that since Joe Louis knocked him out in four punches nine weeks ago his co-ordination has been impaired.

From the first punch, when Allen's right cut Paychek's left ear, the crowd of 4,000 saw a savage fight seldom equaled in the history of boxing. There was no question of Allen's superiority.

Allen, at 179, was outweighed 51 pounds.

Governors Stress Invasion Threat

DULUTH, Minn., June 6.—(AP)—A half dozen of the nation's governors who last night ended a four-day conference on state and national problems, returned to their homes today leaving behind a grim picture of a nation faced with necessity of preparing to meet the threat of an invasion.

Governor Lloyd C. Stark of Minnesota, retiring chairman of the executive committee of the national governors' conference, summed

the gloomy note in his final speech last night.

With German armies battering the French lines, along the Somme river, he said, "It looks as though the other two great democracies in the world (France and England) are going under."

"That leaves only the United States, and we cannot hope to remain immune from attack for long."

Governor Harold E. Stinson of Minnesota, host to the conference, said the meeting's outstanding accomplishments were the emphasis placed on national defense needs, and on the necessity of wiping out barriers to interstate trade.

Politics was taboo during the conference.

Youthful Hurler Downs Indians, 6-1

The Washington Senators' Walter Masterson, who won't be 20 years old until June 22, set the Cleveland Indians on their ears 6-1 yesterday with a four-hit pitching performance that was the day's brightest achievement in the major leagues.

The St. Louis Browns nudged the Boston Red Sox into their third straight defeat, 4-3 in 14 innings, to preserve the one-half game margin between the Sox and Indians at the top of the standings.

The Browns pushed across two runs in the ninth to tie the count, and placed their third in the hands of young Bob Harris, who pitched seven scoreless innings in relief and singled the winning run across with two out in the fourth.

Schoolboy Rowe pitched and batted the Detroit Tigers, 10-9, in a night game. He scattered seven hits in acquiring his fourth victory without defeat and batted in three of Detroit's runs.

The New York Yankees jumped on Lefty Lee for 12 hits and staged the Chicago White Sox 7-3. Pearson weakened in the ninth and gave up three runs, including a pinch homer by Silvestri.

The Cincinnati Reds improved their station in the National League with 7-2 conquest of the New York Giants. Thompson allowed ten hits and knocked in three runs to make sure of his seventh victory.

In the only other game in the senior circuit the Chicago Cubs edged out the Phillies 3-2 with Daisa accounting for all Chicago's runs on a double with bases loaded.

Insides of Human Pictured in Color

WASHINGTON, June 6.—A device for making color pictures of the inside of the human body was announced today by three Atlanta, Ga., physicians.

Dr. Edgar G. Ballenger, Dr. Harold P. McDonald and Dr. Reese C. Coleman reported in the Southern Surgeon, a medical journal, that they had adapted a miniature color

camera to a cystoscope, one of the four types of telescopes used to explore inside the body, and had made photographs of the bladder's interior.

Surgeons here declared that the camera also might be adapted to instruments used to examine the interior of the head, lungs and stomach.

With these instruments it is possible to peer into the body cavities through a series of lenses arranged in a flexible tube which has a tiny electric light bulb on the end. It is also possible to perform delicate operations with long instruments which are thrust through the tube and manipulated with the aid of the light.

Heretofore the surgeon operating was the only person who could watch the operation. Now, the Atlanta surgeons declared, it is possible to photograph the various stages of the operation and demonstrate it to others.

Various kinds of cancerous and other growths, injuries and sores also can be photographed in natural color to aid students and physicians in identifying and perhaps curing them.

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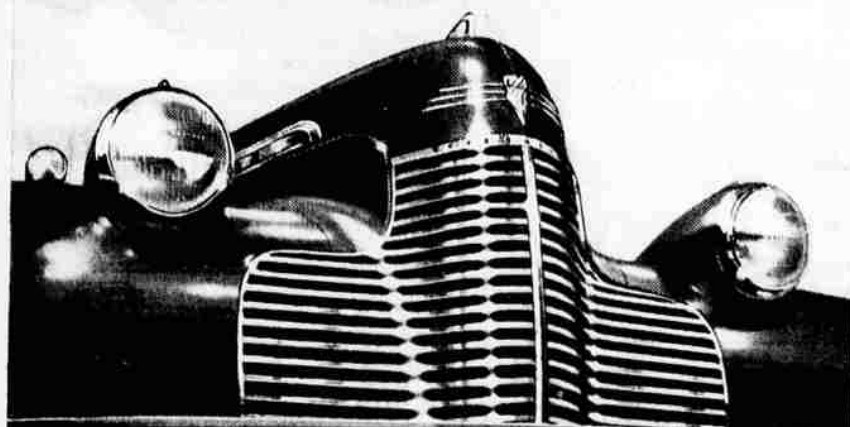
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
