

Foxx' Homer Keeps Red Sox at Top

Cleveland Noses Out Senators in 11th Frame; Brooklyn Wins Fifth Game in Row.

Jimmie Foxx and Lefty Grove, who have been performing feats of baseball magic these many years, still can hit a rabbit out of a hat when the occasion demands.

Decision demanded yesterday and these two long-time associates beat the St. Louis Browns 3-1 to preserve the Boston Red Sox' shaky half game grip on the American league lead.

Grove has been uttering for weeks as a starting pitcher. He was getting knocked out in every game. And when he stiffened the sluggish Browns on six hits in this one he still was on the verge of losing 10 because one of the hits was a home run.

Then Foxx, who had shared Grove's glory for years, came to bat in the ninth inning with two on and two out and poked out his 14th homer of the season to win the game.

The victory broke Boston's three-game losing streak.

The Cleveland Indians were poised to take over the lead if Boston had been beaten. The Tribe's terrific infield twins, Boudreau and Mark, took charge of beating the Washington Senators 5-4 in 11 innings. Held at bay by the fine hurling of Rube Bess Hudson for seven innings, Cleveland tied the score in the eighth when Mack homered. Then in the 11th Boudreau singled home the run that won.

Dodgers Win 5th Straight

In the National League the Brooklyn Dodgers nursed a new winning streak to five games and moved within a game of the pace-setting Cincinnati Reds by beating the St. Louis Cardinals 9-5.

The Pittsburgh Pirates battled the Boston Bees into a tie for the cellar spot with a 7-6 triumph.

The Chicago Cubs set off their biggest hitting fireworks of the season to trounce the Phillies 11-5.

The world champion New York Yankees and the Detroit Tigers both were out-battled.

Pitcher Ross hit a two-run homer as the Philadelphia Athletics nipped the New York Yankees for three runs in the third. Then Detroit batted Ross out of the box in the eighth only to have the A's score three more runs in the last half of the same inning and win 7-6.

The Chicago White Sox were held to three hits by Chandler for eight innings but got three more and the big game, 4-3, with a two-run homer in the ninth after New York had scored twice in the last of the eighth.

Oaks Take League Lead From Seattle

The Oakland A's were back at the top of the heap in the Pacific Coast league today after taking their third straight game from the erstwhile leading Seattle Rainiers.

Although their lead was so precarious that a loss tonight would drop them back into second place, the advantage of nine percentage points afforded some measure of satisfaction to the A's who lost six games out of seven at Seattle two weeks ago.

The third successive win came last night when Oakland defeated Seattle 3 to 2. Salvoes, Oakland pitcher, held Seattle batters to six hits and knocked in the winning run himself.

All of Oakland's runs were lunched in the fourth inning.

San Francisco continued to skid toward the bottom of the standings when Sam Diego defeated them 13 to 3 last night.

The Seals used four pitchers, including Manager O'Neil, in an effort to stop the San Diego batters. Jack Burns, regularly a first baseman, finally ended up on the mound for San Francisco. It was the fifth defeat for the Seals in their last eleven games.

Sacramento downed Los Angeles 7 to 4.

Hollywood shut out Portland 6 to 0 for its second win in three games with the cellar team.

Hurler Kenney Laurence Shuts Out Gobbler; His Brother, Pin, Gets Broken Leg.

Securities From Seized Nations Under U. S. Ban

WASHINGTON, June 7.—(AP)—The government clamped restrictions on the importations of securities today in an order designed to block the sale of such wealth seized from owners in Europe's invaded countries.

Treasury officials said that they were acting to prevent "dumping" in this country's markets of securities that may have been seized from "rightful owners" in Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Norway and Luxembourg.

Effective today, the importation of securities from any foreign country was prohibited unless the securities were submitted to a federal reserve bank for examination.

Oregon to Be Told of Own Scenic Attractions

SALEM, June 6.—(AP)—The state highway commission, beginning next Monday, will sponsor a daily program over state-owned radio station KCMZ at Corvallis to acquaint residents of Oregon with the scenic and recreational attractions of their own state.

The commission since 1935 has advertised Oregon's attractions throughout the nation but it never before has done any travel promotion inside the state. The program will be called "Oregon on Parade" and will be broadcast from 9 to 10 p. m. daily during June, July and August.

Inaccurate Scales in Oregon Areas Condemned

SALEM, June 6.—(AP)—About 25 per cent of heavy scales tested in southern and western Oregon have been condemned because they are inaccurate, the state department of agriculture said today.

The department said most of the weighing errors were unintentional, and that few condemnations were made in eastern Oregon.

Coast Artillery Dated at Mouth of Columbia

SALEM, June 6.—(AP)—Oregon's 249th coast artillery will begin 15 days of training at the mouth of the Columbia river next Tuesday, the regiment's problem being to drive off imaginary air attacks on the river's defense system, national guard headquarters announced today.

Airplanes will tow targets for the regiment's anti-aircraft guns, and small balloons will be released as additional targets. Using powerful searchlights, the regiment also will conduct night operations.

2 More Veterans Hospitals Sought

SACRAMENTO, Calif., June 6.—(AP)—Passage of bills authorizing the erection of a United States veterans hospital and home in California and a hospital for the insane at Bellingham, Wash., was urged by Governor Culbert L. Olson today in letters to two committees of the house of representatives.

The governor urged prompt action to prevent the bills being killed during the closing days of the current session of congress.

More than 500 veterans entitled to receive care in veterans' hospitals are now being treated in California mental hospitals, he wrote the committee on world war veterans legislation.

The committee on territories was told by the governor that not only California but all the Pacific coast and mountain states and Alaska are "anxious" for the passage of the bill establishing a hospital for the insane at Bellingham.

The hospital, he said, would provide care for certain mentally diseased beneficiaries of the government "for whom no adequate provision now exists in this part of the country."

He said they included North American Indians, officers and enlisted men of the coast guard, the coast and geodetic survey, the lithographic service, bureau of fisheries, American seamen of the merchant marine, drug addicts and mentally diseased persons who have committed offenses against the United States.

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
