# Rose Festival At Climax of Beauty

PORTLAND, Ore., June 7.—(AP)—Great floods of rain-freshened blooms turned Portland streets into a garden today for the grand floral procession of the annual rose festival.

Twenty thousand spectators filled Multnomah civic stadium to watch 67 floats and 43 marching units take their positions for the trek through crowded-lined avenues.

The sun held out fairly strong for the parade after an early morning shower.

Mefer and Frank company of Portland won the grand sweepstakes award in the professional class. Rotary club of Portland took the top award in the non-professional division.

First place among floats from cities outside of Oregon went to Washougal, Wash. San Francisco was second and Camas, Wash., third.

Oregon City was first in cities outside of Portland, Multnomah second and Tigard third.

The rose show held the spotlight yesterday.

Mrs. Paul R. Skelton of Portland won the sweepstakes prize in the open division. Sweepstakes winner in the 4-H division was Edwin Parker of Portland.

# Teamsters Strike Halts Goods Flow

OAKLAND, Calif., June 7.—(AP)—The usual situation was reversed today in the Oakland A.P.L. teamsters' union strike when the union minimized the effectiveness of its walkout while employers contended the strike threatened the jobs of 36,000 men.

The employers, at the same time, asked the personal intervention of Daniel J. Tobin, international president of the teamsters.

E. B. Field, president of the Oakland plan, an employers' organization, said the strike had halted the flow of merchandise, and telegraphed Tobin that unless the teamsters went back to work conditions paralleling the 1934 San Francisco general strike would result.
