## U. S. Hop Growers Win South American Trade

**PORTLAND, June 10.**—(AP)—American hopgrowers at last have moved into the South American market, formerly held tightly by Italy and Germany, export circles here heard today.

Germany and other European nations have dominated the South American market for decades, even after the outbreak of the European war. Germany recently has filled customer orders by shipping hops through Italy.

The size of recent South American orders was not revealed.

A few contracts for 1940 hops were written here last week at about 35 cents a pound for peeled and 41 cents for unpeeled, giving the growers a substantial profit, the brokers said. Previous contracts for 22 to 25 cents a pound have tied up about 100,000 bales, or about half of the 1940 crop in Oregon, Washington and California. Only about 700 bales of last year's crop is unsold.

Crop conditions in the Willamette valley have been improved by warmer weather.

Shortly after winning the contest she had the opportunity of meeting in person Mina Strauss, noted opera singer from New York City, who criticized several of Miss Paulson's songs and found them to be of unusual merit both from the standpoint of theme and actual construction. Realizing the many obstacles confronting an amateur song writer, Miss Strauss offered to take sample copies of several of her songs with her back to New York where she will personally present them to leading song critics. Miss Paulson chose two of her compositions and applied to the Library of Congress Copyright office for copyrights which she received without delay.

The songs are now on their way to New York and it is expected that they will be given an orchestral arrangement and presented to the public by means of radio which will be the final test of their commercial possibilities.
