Agr.)—HOGS—Butchers unevenly strong to 15 higher; early sales showed most advances; bulk good-choice 170-220 lb. weights 6.10-6.25; latter tops most carloads 6.25; light-hights 6.25-75; slaughter pigs down to 4.50; 230-280 lb. butchers 5.25-75; packing sows strong to 25 higher, mainly 4.25-75.

CATTLE—Fed steers best demand, steady to 25 higher; grass steers slow, few early sales about steady, but other bids lower, buyers about steady, fed steers practically absent; cows steady to 25 lower; other classes steady; bulk medium-good fed steers 9.50-10.25; latter top on 3 loads good light steers; medium grade steers 8.25-9.25, largely grassers; common 7.75 down; grass heifers up

to 8.50; load good 930-lb. beef cows 7.50, other medium-good cows 6.25-7.50; cutter-common cows 4.75-6.00; canners 3.75-5.50; medium-good sausage bulls 6.50-7.25; common vealers up to 5.50.

SHEEP—Spring lambs weak to 25 lower; top 8.50 on two dekla good-choice; bulk good-choice drivens 8.25 to mostly 8.50, older classes steady; shorn yearlings 5.00-5.50; load good 118-lb. shorn slaughter ewes 3.00.
