U. of O. Graduates Five From Douglas

A record number of University of Oregon students, 771 in all, of whom five are from Douglas county, received diplomas and certificates at an impressive ceremony Sunday evening, when the institution held its 63rd annual commencement exercises at McArthur court.

The list included two doctor of education degrees, three doctor of jurisprudence, and 73 master of arts or science. Among the total are 49 doctors of medicine from the University of Oregon medical school in Portland, which this year for the first time held its own ceremony in the new auditorium.

Dr. Donald M. Erb, president of the university, delivered the commencement address on "The Price of Freedom" while Dr. James R. Brautson, head of the university department of religion, delivered the baccalaureate sermon Sunday morning on "Education and Social Responsibility." Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of higher education, represented the state system of higher education, and Edgar W. Smith, Portland member of the board of higher education represented that group.

McNary's Oregon Vote Topped Roosevelt Total

SALEM, June 11.—(AP)—E. S. Son, Charles L. McNary, who will be Oregon's favorite son for the presidential nomination at the republican national convention, which opens in Philadelphia June 24, got more votes in the May 29 primary than President Roosevelt and Vice-President Garner combined the secretary of state's office reported today.

McNary got 123,488 votes, compared with 109,912 for President Roosevelt and 15,581 for Garner. Republican write-ins votes included Levey 5,190, Tritt 254, Wilkie 227 and Vandenberg 26.

Oregon's democratic and republican delegations will be pledged to Sen. Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin and Dewey, respectively.
