

Grange Head Backs Defense Program

SALEM, June 12.—(AP)—The Grange "must support adequate national defense and complete preparedness," Louis J. Tabor of Columbia, Oreg., master of the national Grange, telegraphed the Oregon state Grange today.

The telegram, read at the state Grange convention, said:

"In this hour of world tragedy, the Grange faces its greatest opportunity for constructive service. We must support adequate national defense and complete preparedness. The Grange should proclaim its faith in democracy and the American way of life, and we should keep alive the battlefields of Europe. The national Grange challenges the Grange of the great state of Oregon to increase membership locally and nationally. National welfare depends on national unity. As master of the national Grange, I again challenge the Grange of the great northwest to set an example to the nation in fighting for our program and in patriotism and in progress."

The Grange voted to hold its 1941 convention in Newport, Glenn L. Adams of West Salem was re-elected treasurer.

tion in an effort to keep reinforcements from moving up to aid in the defense of the half-emptied capital.

The French replied with bombing expeditions extending "deep" into the German interior, the French spokesman said.

He said the Germans even were throwing their training tanks into the battle.

LONDON, June 12.—(AP)—The air ministry announced the royal air force in a ten-minute action, supporting the allies against the thrust, dropped high explosive and incendiary bombs at the rate of over 100 a minute.

The raid, executed yesterday, was one of a series against German concentrations northeast of Rouen. The air ministry said convoys were wrecked, mechanized columns scattered and road junctions blocked.

The announcement said 29 German armored vehicles received a full salvo of bombs and that 10 big tanks were enveloped in smoke and debris when heavy bombs fell around them.

The announcement said that other targets "successfully attacked" included an anti-aircraft battery near Le Sandeville and a mechanized column at Etcheville.

The royal air force also bombed military objectives at Cologne and elsewhere in western Germany yesterday, the air ministry announced tonight.

BERLIN, June 12.—(AP)—Authorized German sources said today that it would be a "crime" for the French to defend Paris as the Polish-defended Warsaw and they expressed their utmost concern for the fate of the capital in the event it should be so defended.

Warsaw, besieged and under attack for nearly a month last fall, was largely in ruins before it was surrendered.

The Germans emphasized that indications were becoming clearer every day that the declarations of French leaders that they would defend Paris was a mere "pretext" to accuse the German army of "Kulturverschand"—cultural disgrace.

This situation, in the view of authorized circles, is clearly aimed at establishing a "Lustgarten" case as

Mrs. Roosevelt Favors Compulsory Training

NEW YORK, June 12.—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt said today she favored universal compulsory training for men and women of all ages in civilian lines of endeavor which could, in time of national emergency, be directed to ward the prosecution of war.

She said, however, that she still was opposed to conscription for military service.

Mrs. Roosevelt said the nation "should require of every individual six months or a year of equal training with everyone else."

"I don't care who they are," she added, "and girls as well as boys should be included."

"This thinking that you can meet a beautifully-planned machine with out preparation is utter nonsense," she added. "You can't meet efficiency with inefficiency."

NYA Dept. Ready For Forest Fires

CORVALLIS, June 11.—(AP)—If you have a forest fire this summer just call the fire department, says E. F. Mason, assistant dean of forestry at Oregon State college, who has just completed setting up a "fire department" for this purpose.

Starting with an NYA summer project for college students, the school of forestry, in cooperation with a half dozen other state and federal forestry agencies, has established what may prove to be a history making experiment in forest fire control.

On the Pecky Arboretum, seven miles north of here, there will be maintained all summer a camp of some 50 men students in forestry in charge of George H. Schroeder, assistant professor of forestry and a recognized specialist in forest fire fighting.

The student will be trained in the latest methods and will be on call to go anywhere in the state in multiple of five men. While in camp here they will be paid only \$20 a month by NYA from which they will pay their own board on a cooperative basis. When called out they will receive regular forest fire fighters wages.

Fisherman Lost Off Columbia River Bar

ASTORIA, Ore., June 12.—(AP)—A derelict fishing boat, the Diver, its motor running and trailing lines out, manned for a time by the salmon fleet off the Columbia bar yesterday after the operator apparently fell overboard and drowned.

Fishermen said the Diver went out yesterday morning with Alex Subimen of Astoria aboard. They said he probably fell while tending lines. He is the second fisherman to disappear from a boat here this season.

Swindler, Burglar Get Prison Sentences Here

A sentence of two years in the state penitentiary was imposed here today upon J. W. Gearhart, 42, of San Francisco, who pleaded guilty in circuit court to a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

This drew opposition yesterday from Democratic Leader Barkley and Senator Byrnes (D., S. C.). They argued that the war department did not want to train the CCC enrollees for combat work, but merely needed trained cooks, photographers, mechanics and other skilled workers.

Few objections developed to President Roosevelt's request to add to the measure a \$50,000,000 fund to supplement European relief activities of the American Red Cross.

dian border. The Douglas Aircraft corporation of Burbank, Calif., successor to the Northrup company, was reported to have agreed to accept them in payment of new planes to be delivered later to the army.

The concentration at Houston was said to have been decided upon as the most direct way of getting the ships, which are 4 or 7 years old, to the allies.

The 35 airplanes being traded in are of type of which the army once ordered scores. But the air corps decided last year to substitute light bombers with longer range for the attack planes. The latter have been used recently as transport craft.

They are single-motor monoplane, each armed with five machine guns and carrying 20 small or four large bombs—or alternately—a load of chemical fire stroke screens. They were designed especially to harass enemy troops from low altitude.

Other Surpluses to Be Sold

Stephen Early, presidential secretary, also reported that the war department had informed President Roosevelt today that it was ready to "accelerate progress" in surveys of materials and supplies that may be advantageously disposed surplus. These will be turned over to a subsidiary sales company, set up by the United States Steel company for resale to the allies.

There were steps in which "all for the allies" passed from the foreign stage to a program of action.

Leaders on Capitol hill resorted to legislative short cuts, working the provisions for assistance into the \$5,921,619,622 sheet of national preparedness bills now in the final clearance stages.

Extension of the European combat zone to blanket the entire Mediterranean was ordered by the president, ending American-borne maritime commerce with Italy.

Both senate and house responded yesterday to the call the chief executive sounded Monday at Charlottesville, Va.

The senate voted 67 to 18 to empower him to "trade in" war weapons from allies to field artillery to manufacturers, who then would be free to resell them to the allies.

Wheeler Threatens Bolt

Senator Wheeler (D., Mont.) declared in the senate today he would "break with the democratic party" if it became a "war party" and added that he would not support any presidential candidate "who is going to try to get us into this war."

"I don't want to have to break with the administration," Wheeler told his colleagues. "I don't want to have to break with the democratic party, but if it becomes necessary to break with the democratic party, shall break with it. If it becomes a war party."

"I'm not going to support any candidate for president who's going to try to get us into this war," Wheeler, who differed sharply with the administration over President Roosevelt's supreme court reorganization plan, has more recently been reported on friendly terms with the president.

He made his assertion today after Senator Holt (D., W. Va.) had asserted that the sale of army and navy equipment to the allies had been accomplished "under subterfuge and under hypocrisy."

British Reports Given

British reports told of Italian air raids on Malta; advice reaching Geneva said Crown Prince Umberto planned to throw his Italian shock troops against the French in the southern maritime Alps, and the Swiss telegraphic agency reported a clash of French Tunisia and Corsica.

The British also said their planes bombed Italian air bases in Libya and Eritrea, in east Africa, and that south African planes raided Italian Moyale, near Kenya colony.

(Al Nice, all was reported quiet on the Italian border, although all bridges between Italy and France were reported blown up.)

BRITISH BOMBERS ATTACK ITALIANS IN ETHIOPIA

PRETORIA, South Africa, June 12.—(AP)—The first South African war communiqué said today:

"South African air force heavy bombers yesterday attacked military objectives in Abyssinia, (Ethiopia.)

"Extensive damage to buildings, personnel, roads and equipment was done."

"Although heavy machine-gun fire was encountered all our aircraft returned safely."

Abyssinia, or Ethiopia, is the African kingdom which Italy took from Haile Selassie in 1935-36.

Planes belonging to the British dominion of South Africa have been operating from bases in Kenya colony on the east Africa coast, which has 200 miles of frontier with Italian Somaliland and 250 miles of frontier with Ethiopia.

From bases just inside Kenya, planes would have 100 miles to fly to reach Addis Ababa, capital of Ethiopia and 650 air miles to cross completely over Ethiopia to Italian held Eritrea.
