British Warplanes Deal Heavy Blows

Germans, Italians Assailed in Various Localities With Success, London Reports.

LONDON, June 12.—(AP)—For the third day of unrelenting air attacks, British bombers dived through anti-aircraft fire today and came back to their bases with accounts of smashed enemy hangars, ships set afire and troops and supply centers blasted in Norway, France and Africa.

In Norway: Bombers who groped through mist and fog bombed German shipping in Bergen harbor by the dull red glare of the fires they started along the waterfront. A fort, an anti-aircraft battery and ships in the harbor were reported hit. A German airplane at Vornes also was bombed, wrecking runways and hangars. German ground crews who rushed from their quarters were machine-gunned by the diving plane.

In the North sea: Planes "laid bombs" through fog attacks on German destroyers, but could not see whether they were hit.

In France: British navy fleets claimed their bombs blew up a German motor speedboat and damaged other ships and ammunition barges in the German-held port of Boulogne.

Operating from bases in Egypt, the west coast province of Kenya and perhaps other fields, British bombers continued raids on Italian ships, airbases, and land supply and troop centers in Libya on the Mediterranean. Italian-conquered Abyssinia, and Eritrea along the Red sea, Italian bombers were credited with direct hits on air-frames, forts and munitions dumps in Ethiopia, and at Addis Ababa, the capital of Ethiopia. Attacks across the lower end of the Red sea from the British protectorate of Aden, and objectives at the towns of Asmara and Gura were attacked. Ports and Libya also were bombed a second time. Meanwhile British Africa claimed they scored heavy losses in their raids yesterday on troop and supply bases in Abyssinia.

The British also were attacked. German planes were seen over the southeast coast of England, apparently on a scouting mission. Five Arabs were killed and six wounded and one bomber, supposed to be Italian, was shot down during raids on parts of Aden.

Willamette Valley Wool Brings Around 32 Cents

PORTLAND, June 13.—(AP)—Market sources confirmed the sale of 1,250,000 to 1,750,000 pounds of wool within the last few days in the Portland trading area outside the Willamette valley.

Interior range wools were quoted from 27 to 29 cents a pound with crossbreds at the higher figure. Willamette valley sales were reported around 32 cents a pound. The market suggested that about 5,000,000 pounds were held in Portland houses.
