

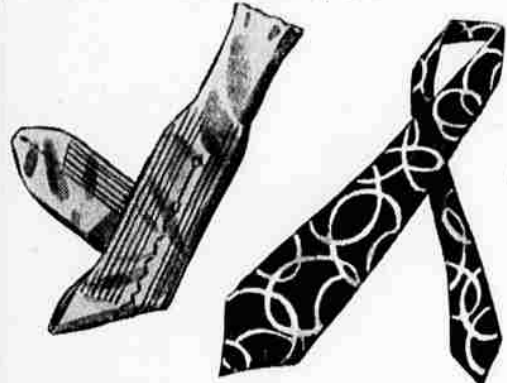

New U. S. Battleship North Carolina Launched

NEW YORK, June 12.—(AP)—A great grayhulled, man-of-war, christened the U. S. North Carolina by a daughter of that southern state and heralded as an important unit in national defense, slipped down the ways of Brooklyn navy yard today.

Miss Isabel Young Hoey, daughter of North Carolina's governor, smashed a bottle of champagne against the bow of the \$70,000,000, 22,000-ton battleship. Shortly later the vessel, a sister ship of the U. S. S. Washington which was launched at Philadelphia on June 1, struck the water.

Secretary of the Navy Charles Edison said: "It is the ships which are completed in time of peace which make a nation strong enough to preserve peace. . . We build now, not to aggress, but to be too strong to be aggressed."

Reuters (British news agency) dispatch from Aden said that an enemy bomber—presumably Italian—was shot down when that British possession at the southern end of the Red sea was raided early today.

Five Arabs were reported killed and six wounded in a series of three raids last night and this morning.

Aden is across a narrow strait from Italian Eritrea.

CAIRO, EGYPT, June 12.—(AP)—A British-Italian skirmish

on the Egyptian-Italian Libyan border last night in which the British took 62 prisoners was reported today by British authorities here.

The British said they suffered no casualties. Two officers were among the captives. Two machine-guns were reported taken.

SANTA CRUZ DE TENERIFE, Canary Islands, June 12.—(AP)—The crew of the Italian steamer Malta was reported today to have driven their ship aground at Las Galletas beach in the Canary Islands yesterday after a French warship in hot pursuit had fired several shells at her.

to Great Britain, was reported under way.

One legislator who attended a conference of several senators and at least one representative in the office of Senator Clark (D., Mo.) yesterday said the aim of some present was to form a loose organization to prevent assistance to the allies from becoming a public, governmental matter rather

than a private one.

More Planes to Be Sent
The senate was the last of the record-making \$5,021,619,622 "pre-emption bills" today as Capitol Hill heard reports of "excellent progress" toward further aid to the allies in planes, munitions and possibly destroyers.

The total of planes made available for the allies rose to 263 with the release of 80 Northrop, six Seversky and 177 Curtiss biplanes. They are of a type discharged by the army last year in favor of longer-range light bombers.

The final big defense measure—an extraordinary \$1,706,653,908 appropriation for both army and navy purposes—bore the overwhelming approval of a 491-111 house vote. Rep. Marchant (A., L., N. Y.) was the sole opponent.

Double-quick senate action was a foregone conclusion, once the legislation clears the appropriations committee.

CCC Training Rejected
House passage of the bill late yesterday shared legislative attention with the senate's refusal by a 47 to 35 vote, to sanction voluntary military training for civilian conservation corps enrollees—something which the army command declined to endorse.

The action was viewed in some quarters as an indication that the senate would not favor nationwide compulsory military training at this time.

Both Speaker Bankhead and Majority Leader Rayburn of the house said congress probably would be here after the June 22 date on which administration leaders had hoped to adjourn.

Rep. Celler (R., N. Y.) introduced a resolution to repeal the neutrality act. He called it a "shallow fiction." This country is not and cannot be neutral, he said, citing various types of assistance already given the British and France; and "the president's telling denunciation of Premier Mussolini."

Defense Outlay Boosted
The \$1,706,653,908 defense appropriation bill would boost the total provided for army and navy expenditure in the year starting July 1 to \$5,021,619,622.

In addition to providing funds for 3,600 new army planes, for starting work on 68 new combat ships for the navy and for an unspecified number of new tanks and other weapons, the bill would finance addition of 95,000 men to the regular army, bringing its total enlisted strength to 375,000 men.

The measure also carries \$2-

358,000 to give the federal bureau of investigation 500 additional agents to combat spies and saboteurs and \$32,000,000 for the civil aeronautics authority to give primary, secondary and "refresher" training to approximately 87,000 civilian pilots in the next fiscal year.

and other armament would have an extremely important effect on the outcome of the battle for France, the spokesman declared, referring to the need for more aid from America.

French bombing planes have attacked the German cities of Mannheim, Neustadt and Frankfurt, a war ministry spokesman said.

The spokesman declared that the French would defend their lines in front of Paris and if forced back would defend them south of the capital. His statement was issued at Tours, one of the seats of the French government, and relayed through Paris.

"We do not want to battle in
