## Newly Ordered Rate Aids Cattle Shippers

WASHINGTON, June 12.—(AP)—The interstate commerce commission ordered today a rate on all shipments of stocker and feeder livestock in the western district of 85 per cent of the fat cattle rate. The western district includes Chicago and all territory to the west. The present rate on shipments to points other than public markets—the country for feeding—is 85 per cent of the fat cattle rate. On shipments to public markets, however, the full fat cattle rate applies.

The railroads had proposed to discontinue the 85 per cent rate on shipments not to public markets unless a reshipment of the livestock was made by rail within 18 months.

The commission said the railroads' proposal to place the 85 per cent rate on a reshipment basis "would be unjust and unreasonable and has not been justified."
