Every state, county and city official or board that handles public money should publish at regular intervals an accounting of it, showing where and how each dollar is spent. This is a fundamental principle of democratic government.

TODAY, over the entire United States of America, we are celebrating Flag day.

It was on June 14, 1777, that congress considered a resolution providing for the creation and official authorization of the first American flag.

There is nothing actually in the record to show that congress ever approved the resolution. However, we do know that on June 14, 1777, the congress was considering the flag problem. Legend has it that Washington ordered a flag and that Betsy Ross made it. That is a good origin and, record of the transaction or not, we shall believe that today we actually celebrated a birthday of the flag.

But with the second war with England it did fly in all its glory. . . . The record is straight from that point: that the stars, an ancient symbol of India, Persia and Egypt, symbolize dominion, sovereignty, that only Denmark, Holland, Switzerland have older flags, that a shipmaster, one Capt. William Driver of Salem, Mass., first called it "Old Glory," in 1813, and finally that the Star Spangled Banner inspired by the flag in 1812 did not officially become a national anthem until approved by congress and President Hoover in 1931.

This year the observance of flag day has far more than usual significance. It is a wonderful thing that we yet have a flag to honor—that we have not felt the heel of the Nazi oppressor. The words "not yet" might be used in the previous sentence, but with proper preparation we will not need to consider the possibility of losing our flag and our national identity.

Since last Flag day—Flag day for the United States, that is—Poland, Karelian Finland, Denmark, Norway, Luxembourg, Holland and Belgium have passed out of existence as nations. Shortly before North China, Ethiopia, Austria, Czechoslovakia and Albania were torn by invasion and their existence ended.

Likely before the present struggle is ended other nations will be removed from the map. But we have something on this continent that is worth preserving, worth fighting for. We want no infiltration of European political control on either of the American continents. We want to trade in the Americas with whom we please when we please and in whatever ships we please. To preserve this situation we must prepare. The flag of the United States must wave in all its glory and with all honor not only today but forever.

where warships can't go. But with our commerce NATIONS STARVE, and the bulk of international commerce moves by water.

If he can't control the seas, Hitler will lose in the long run, just as Napoleon did.

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT, speaking on the day of Italy's entrance into the war on the side of the Germans, says:

"We (the U. S.) will pursue two obvious and simultaneous courses. We will extend to the opponents of force (meaning Britain and France) the material resources of this nation and at the same

time we will harness and speed up the use of these resources in order that we ourselves in the Americas may have equipment and training equal to the task of ANY EMERGENCY and every defense."

Read it as you will, that statement falls just short of a declaration of war.

YOU may approve it. You may disapprove it. But you must admit that it commits us to a program of SUPREME EFFICIENCY in the task of preparation we are undertaking. Wherever we are going, we mustn't be caught short of what we will need.

New Pill Is Bar To Scarlet Fever

By HOWARD W. BLAKESLEE (Associated Press Science Editor) NEW YORK, June 13.—A pill which immunizes against scarlet fever was announced to the American Medical Association today.

These pills are a substitute for vaccination and are taken with a drink of water.

They were developed by Dr. George F. Dick and Gladys Henry Dick, who devised the scarlet fever vaccine.

The pills have been tried on 102 persons, the Dick reported. They are taken daily for two or three weeks. Of these test cases, 94 percent were immunized and the rest had transient scarlatine rashes.

The pills are not now recommended as a general substitute for vaccination, the Dick stated. They should be used on persons for whom scarlatine are risky, who are allergic to hives, who have had heart or when speed is urgent during an epidemic.

It took eight years to get a mouth immunizing substance which human beings could take. At the start the Dick developed a liquid which immunized but such enormous quantities had to be drunk that it was not practicable.

Next came a white powder, which also immunized. But this made people seasick. Finally the pills in tablet form were developed. A coating over the tablet prevents it from dissolving in the stomach, and so avoids nausea. Dissolution occurs in the intestines.

Blitzkrieg Posts Speedy Successes

Adolf Hitler's Nazi legions poured through the gates of Paris today, ninth day of the blitzkrieg drive toward the capital started by the Germans June 5.

In the Franco-Prussian war, the Germans bombarded Paris for three and one-half months before they succeeded.

The Paris development in the next timetable of invasion marked the 35th day after Germany opened her westward sweep through the low countries.

At the same time the Fuehrer announced conclusion of the campaign in Norway which began April 9.

Other notations in the record of Nazi conquests:

Poland—Invaded Sept. 1, 1939; fall of Warsaw announced Sept. 27; capitulation of "last center of military resistance" Oct. 1.

Denmark—Invaded and occupied in a day, April 9, 1940.

Norway—Invaded April 9; virtually abandoned to Germans by May 3; King Haakon arrived in London June 10 after resistance in north ended.

Luxembourg—Invaded and virtually wholly occupied in one day, May 10.

Netherlands—Invaded May 10; commander-in-chief capitulated May 14.

Belgium—Invaded May 10; King Leopold ordered arms laid down May 28.
