## Bulletin on Fumigation Gives Methods, Material

Five types of fumigation are available for growers or handlers of seed, hay, grain or other farm crops requiring treatment for the eradication of insects, according to a new extension circular No. 352, entitled "Fumigation Against Insects," issued at Oregon State college.

It describes the various types of fumigation, the most effective fumigants to use under various conditions, and also contains construction plans for making a suitable fumigation chamber. Copies of the 12-page circular may be had free from any county or state extension office.
