Preparation for a program to reorganize school districts of Douglas county involves careful consideration of many factors affecting the educational interests of all.

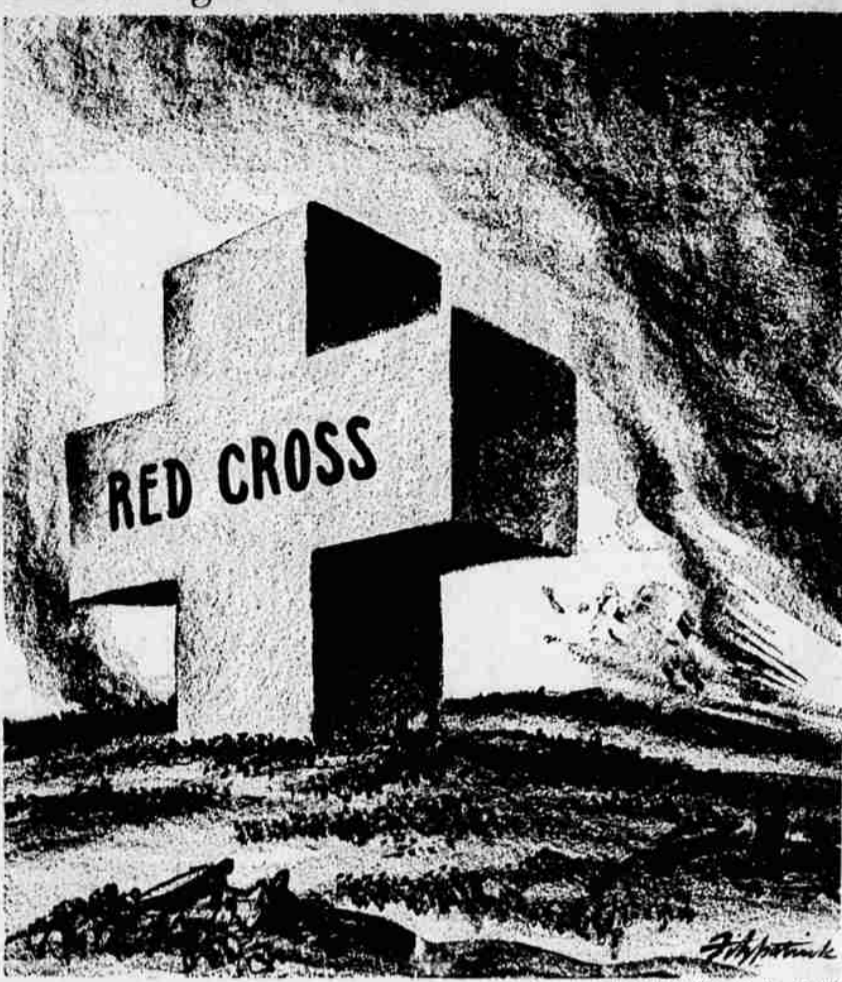
Every school district in the county was visited by the writer, who was employed by the committee to secure data and information regarding existing school conditions.
