U. S. Takes Steps To Protect Trade

German Economic Control of Central Europe Presents Serious Problem.

By CLAUDE A. JAGGER (Associated Press Financial Editor). NEW YORK, June 18.—French capitalization to Germany has brought America face-to-face with the possibility of a world in which close to 400,000,000 Europeans may be regimented into a vast nazified economy.

What this might mean to America's daily job of manufacturing and selling, working and making a living, is receiving closest attention in Washington and Wall street.

True, the war in Europe is not over. England is still uninvaded, and her fleet is the mightiest force on the seas. The central European powers may feel the pinch of lack of gasoline and other vital supplies. Many experts think Germany could not feed herself and conquered countries through another winter. Before many months pass, the European situation may again change drastically.

Yet the prospect of German domination in Europe seemed threatening enough to prompt Washington officials to discuss a plan of a mighty western hemisphere cartel to sell this side of the world's surpluses of production, under a controlled price system, and thus block penetration of Nazi economic control.

It would be easier for the United States to wall herself off from the rest of the world than for any other major power. She is the most nearly self-sufficient. Dollar value of exports in 1939 amounted to 4.6 per cent of the estimated national income. Even France, one of the more nearly self-sufficient of European powers, has shown exports in recent years of about 25 per cent of national income.

But, directly in our own western hemisphere orbit, economists explain, are some of the great raw material producing countries of the earth. Latin America sells abroad about a third of its production, more than half to Europe.

Such products as Canadian and Argentine wheat, South American beef, Chilean copper and Venezuelan oil, enter directly into competition with domestic products of the United States.

Church at Glendale Welcomes New Pastor

GLENDAL, June 19.—Rev. Paul Tidball arrived last week to take over this duties as pastor of the Olivet Presbyterian church of Glendale, preaching his first sermon here last Sunday. Rev. Tidball is a graduate of the Louisville seminary and of the Washington

and Jefferson university of Pennsylvania.

Rev. J. K. Howard, pastor of the church for the past eleven years, last week announced his retirement from the local pulpit. He and Mrs. Howard will continue to reside at their beautiful home at Fir Point, and he will divide his time between the Cow creek communities of Galesville, Anchor and Azalea.

Rev. Howard served the local church from 1908 to 1916, leaving here at that time to make his home in Arizona. He returned in 1929, and has remained here since.

Shun Paternalism, Advice to A. F. L.

KLAMATH FALLS, June 19.—(AP)—Governor Sprague advised the Oregon Federation of Labor in a telegraphic message yesterday to turn its back on governmental paternalism.

Labor, accepting the domination of a friendly government, his message read, may discover later the domination has passed into the hands of an unfriendly government.

"I sincerely hope," Governor Sprague's tidings to the 35th annual federation convention went on, "that . . . organized labor will continue to make its gains by the use of its tremendous economic power rather than by a resort to an over-dose of laws whose intent may be perverted."

Federation officers, after reading the governor's message, announced they had dispatched a message to the chief executive, too. It contained a request that he use his office in an effort to settle the long Western Co-operative company strike in Portland.

Federation President Paul Gurske said the strikers were willing to arbitrate a permanent agreement and asked the governor to petition the management to accept arbitration.

The strike was "recessed" for two weeks to supply needed barrels for the berry traffic but the

truce period ends Friday. Americanism dominated introduction of 87 resolutions, 15 more than at the 1939 convention.

One proposal asked support of the national defense and preparedness program and enforcement of the Monroe doctrine. Another opposed employment of aliens on public jobs. Unions were asked to urge alien members to become citizens. Government manufacture of war supplies also was recommended.

The Astoria milk drivers and dairy employees union opposed initiative efforts to repeal the state milk control act.

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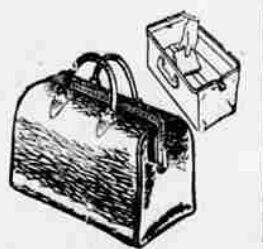
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
