

Democrats Choose Bankhead Keynoter

Barkley is Recommended for Chairman; G. O. P. Chiefs Start Framing Platform.

CHICAGO, June 20.—(AP)—The committee on arrangements today selected Speaker William B. Bankhead for keynoter and recommended Senator Alben W. Barkley of Kentucky for the post of permanent chairman of the democratic national convention.

Bankhead, congressman from Alabama, and Barkley, who delivered the keynote addresses at the 1932 and 1936 conclaves, were selected after National Chairman James A. Farley announced that both he and President Roosevelt favored them for the positions.

Bankhead, a veteran of 12 terms in congress and speaker of the national house since 1936, has been known as a distinguished orator throughout his long political career.

The arrangements committee also discussed other plans for the convention, opening on July 15 at the Chicago stadium.

PLANK BUILDING WORK BEGUN BY REPUBLICANS

PHILADELPHIA, June 20.—(AP)—The republican convention resolutions committee divided into a series of sub-committees today and settled actively down to the business of writing a 1940 platform, using the Glenn Frank report as a starting point.

Separate committees were created to work out declarations on agriculture, tariff and reciprocal trade; relief, reemployment and social security; money banking and public finance; government reorganization and related topics; national development and related topics; government relation to business; and foreign affairs.

The committee had already set up sub-committees on foreign affairs and to do the final drafting job.

Meanwhile, the resolutions committee was confronted with a demand that it declare itself against any measures that might lead America into war.

The national committee filled the vacancy from Oregon caused by the death of Ralph Williams, naming Ralph E. Cake, to take his place as a member of the committee.

ASTORIA, June 20.—(AP)—Walter Norblad, delegate to the republican national convention, en route for Philadelphia yesterday, after announcing that if Senator McNary withdrew he would vote for Wendell Willkie for the republican presidential nomination.

"Willkie is the one republican who can be elected," Norblad said. "He has business experience and education, is liberal in thought and action and is not a politician or self-starter."

WILMINGTON, Del., June 20.—(AP)—Wendell L. Willkie, who seeks the republican presidential nomination, has been re-elected president of the Commonwealth and Southern corporation.

Congress Caught Unaware

The nominations of Knox and Stimson provoked a buzz of excited conversation on the senate floor which testified to the surprise of the appointments. When the reading clerk called out "Stimson" Senator Clark (D., Mo.) asked in a voice audible to the galleries: "Who?"

Senator King (D., Utah) expressed "the hope that there will be prompt action on these able and illustrious men and that they will be approved."

Today's nominations, coming only four days before the opening of the republican national convention in Philadelphia, caught Washington unaware and set congressional and political circles abuzz with talk over its bearing on presidential politics.

Knox War Veteran
Both Knox and Stimson, on occasion, have endorsed the administration's foreign policy. Knox has been, for a republican, a relatively frequent consultant of Mr. Roosevelt's.

It was he who recently organized civilian committees to promote the program for training 50,000 plane pilots.

Knox is 66 years old. A native of Boston, he served with Theodore Roosevelt's "Rough Riders" in the Spanish American war. He was overseas in the world war from May, 1918, until February, 1919, serving in the artillery. He holds his colonelcy in the 356th field artillery covee.

Stimson Backer of Hull

The 73-year-old Stimson, like Knox, served with the artillery in France. He became a colonel in 1918. Born in New York City, he became a member of the bar in 1891 and after a career in law and politics was secretary of war under President Taft, governor general of the Philippines, secretary of state under President Hoover, chairman of the American delegation to the 1936 London naval conference, and chairman of the American delegation in the 1932 disarmament conference. Through letters to newspapers and otherwise he has been a supporter of Secretary Hull's policies in the state department post he once filled.

America Must Aid War Refugees, Sprague Says

SALEM, June 20.—(AP)—America must support French, Belgian and Dutch war refugees "until they can produce food and supplies for themselves," Gov. Charles A. Sprague said last night in a broadcast appeal in behalf of the Marion county Red Cross.

"There is a dispute as to the nature and degree of the military aid we can or should extend to the nations under attack, but there can be no question of our responsibility for administering aid to those great civilian populations uprooted, dislocated, left destitute by the surge of battle," the governor said.

Citizens Cautioned on Fifth Column Prying

PORTLAND, June 20.—(AP)—Edgar Freed, Oregon director of federal reports, discouraged private citizens today from personal investigations of suspected espionage, sabotage and fifth columnists.

"President Roosevelt has given the federal bureau of investigation charge of investigative work in matters relating to these activities," he said. He urged citizens, however, to report suspicious movements to the FBI.

But that, he reminded the committee, was before a new \$4,000,000,000 expansion of the fleet, designed to give it the size of a two-ocean navy, was projected.

The navy now has about 1,800 airplanes. Towers told the committee. There are 1,800 others on order, he added, and bids were opened yesterday for an additional 1,000. He said it was proposed to buy approximately 3,100 with funds which will be available for the year starting July 1.

The 10,000-plane goal originally set was part of a 4-year program, he testified, saying it would be four years before some of the ships with which the planes are to operate will be completed.

The British were reported by Secretary Morgenthau already to be taking over French armament contracts in the United States.

Without waiting for developments on the French offer to surrender, Morgenthau said, the British have been arranging with manufacturers to deliver to them any war materials contracted for but not taken by their ally.

Get Foreign Designs.

Morgenthau announced that the French government had turned over to the United States the designs for the powerful Hispano-Suiza airplane engine.

The French made the patents available to the United States for engine production for both United States and the allies, the treasury chief said.

The British recently gave the United States patent rights on their powerful Rolls-Royce airplane engine.

shouting for a "chance at Jerry." The casualties of the second big air raid were announced after a check by the air ministry and the ministry of home security. The report also mentioned damage in three towns.

Four new age groups will be registered in July under the speed-up enlargement of the British armed forces, the government informed the house of commons today.

The July registrations are expected to bring the total of conscripts, under arms or liable for immediate mobilization, to over 4,000,000.

Ethiopians in Revolt

Reuters, British news agency, in a dispatch from Jibuti, French Somaliland, said revolts against the Italians were beginning in each province of Ethiopia.

It reported Italian planes were visiting Jibuti about four times daily without dropping bombs. The Netherlands government in exile ordered its nationals between the ages of 20 and 26 throughout the world today to register with Netherlands diplomatic representatives for military service.

The French radio said today a proclamation declaring Toulon would be defended with all available means if attacked by enemy forces had been issued by the vice admiral in command of the port. Toulon is a military and naval port on the Mediterranean southeast of Marseilles.

The admiral announced today that the armed merchant cruiser Andania had been torpedoed and sunk.

The announcement said that the trawler Juniper in northern Norwegian waters was overdue and considered lost.

The Andania was a 13,950-ton liner belonging to the Cunard White Star company. She is the fourth British armed cruiser lost since the war began.

second gear on steep grades and you will be perfectly safe. If dust is too bad hold further back from car ahead of you. Do not attempt to pass the car ahead.

A 30-minute stop will be made at Hlahe bridge for a dedication ceremony. Temporary rest rooms will be provided at Hlahe bridge. Because parking space is limited, please park three or four abreast at Hlahe bridge so you can hear and see the program.

When the caravan reaches Dia-

mond lake, it will proceed to the south end where tables are set up and free coffee, sugar and cream will be provided by the forest service. After lunch there will be a short program. Caravaneers are on their own from then on to return to their homes when and how they please.

There is a good bathing beach along the south shore of Diamond lake and a temporary dressing room for ladies will be furnished. Take along your bathing suit. Don't wear expensive clothing for the trip as the road may be dusty.

A service car, furnished by the Hansen Motor company will follow the caravan. In case of mechanical or tire trouble, park your car off the right of way and await the arrival of expert help.

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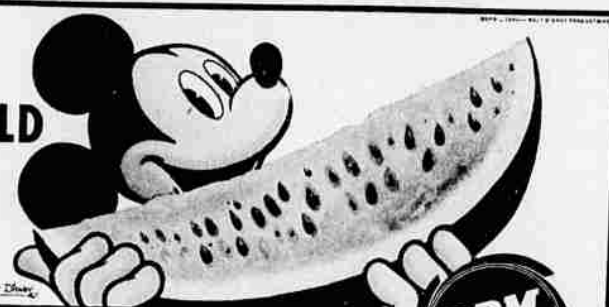

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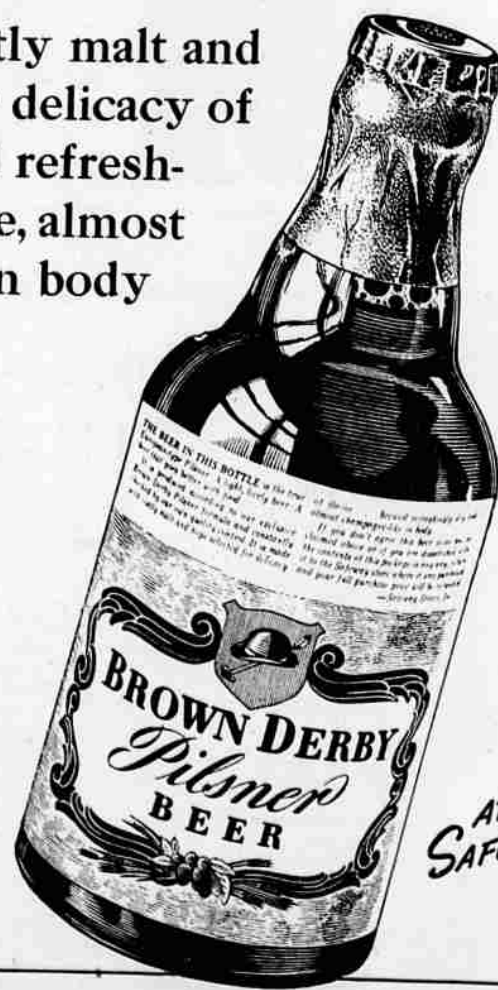
