

Bets Favor Louis In Tonight's Bout

Experts Give Godoy Chance,
However, to Again Stay 15
Rounds With Champion.

NEW YORK, June 20.—(AP)—Arturo Godoy of Chile, who is something less than an inspired fighter, gets his second chance at the world heavyweight championship tonight, when, barring rain, he meets Joe Louis over the 15-round route in Yankee stadium.

Their first scrap last February was far from sensational, yet the mere fact that he lasted the full 15 rounds with the negro champion qualified the South American iron man for an encore. The betting is 5 to 1 against Godoy lifting the title, yet most experts give him an excellent chance of going the limit again.

The buildup for this, Louis' eleventh defense of his crown, has emphasized the negro's well known pride in the power of his fists and his dislike of having an opponent remain erect at the final bell. He has without fail knocked out every man he met the second time, and

his followers are convinced he will smash Godoy tonight.

He might, that, but the task promises difficulties. Louis is in better shape than he was the other time and is in a vengeful frame of mind. But so is his rugged, powerful rival in better condition, and Godoy besides is brimming with confidence born of their other bout. In size they are about a stand-off.

Godoy possibly is the only righter, barring maybe Schmeling and Galento, who has gone into the ring with Louis the champion totally without fear and confident of winning. That is something on his side. Also he has proved to his own satisfaction, at least, that he can absorb the Louis blasts.

The only thing Arturo appears to lack, in fact, is a genuine knock-out punch in his own fists. If Louis didn't hurt him seriously in their first fight, then Arturo certainly did not cause the big negro any great distress, except insofar as his crouching and holding tactics got on Joe's nerves.

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Dodgers, Cincy In Deadlock for Lead

Brooklyn Downs Cardinals in
Bitter Atmosphere Due to
"Beating" of Medwick.

In a rough and tumble fight for the National league pennant, there is no club better fitted to triumph than the Brooklyn Dodgers.

That's why they're right back in a virtual tie with the Cincinnati Reds today for first place in the senior circuit.

The 8-3 trouncing they gave the St. Louis Cardinals last night gave them a percentage of .660. The Reds, who were idle yesterday, have a mark of .663, if carried into the realm of higher mathematics,

and still are technically half a game in front.

The final fracas of the Dodgers-Cardinals series was as wild and whooping as any vaudeville ever staged on Broadway and practically as little like baseball.

The shadow of Ducky Medwick's unfortunate "beating" hovered over the game, and the players of both teams had trouble keeping their minds on the play of the moment. There were nine errors in the game, seven by St. Louis, four by Shortstop Martin Marion and three of his in one inning—tying a major league record.

Manager Southworth of the Cards kept Pitcher Bob Bowman, who threw the ball that struck Medwick, away from the park last night to avert trouble, but in the third inning Catcher Mickey Owen of St. Louis and Manager Shortstop Leo Durocher of the Dodgers got into a fist fight, and the going was tense from start to finish.

But that's the kind of track that the hard-running Dodgers take to

best, and they ended their own four-game losing streak and the Cards' six-game winning string in one swift swoop. They pounded McGee for nine hits in seven and two-thirds innings and these, linked with the errors and two double steals that worked, easily brought Wyatt his sixth victory.
