France and Italy Sign Armistice; Colonies Balk

sons, Tunis, Morocco, Libya and Senegal.

They will get British financing so they can carry on the fight against Germany. It was said.

A large French army is concentrated in Syria and many units of the French fleet are with the British naval forces at Alexandria, Egypt. Whether they and others will accept orders to proceed to French ports for internment remained to be seen.

A British newspaper commentator said enlisted men of the French navy and many officers favored joining the British or scuttling their ships or plunging into a death fight with the Germans rather than yield to internment.

He asserted, however, that in recent days a number of such warlike officers had been replaced with "safe" men who would give up the fleet.

Pasciati said Italy, as her share in the spoils, would demand to occupy all France's Mediterranean coast and later establish a "buffer state" in southern France.

This seizure, coupled with Germany's occupation of France's western seaboard from Dunkerque on the English channel down the Bay of Biscay to Spain, would leave France without a single port.

LONDON, June 24.—(AP)—France will be stripped of her defenses and her coastline and reduced to a landlocked third of her former territory as the reported price of armistice with Germany and Italy.

Adolf Hitler's terms, as published by the British government, compel the French to surrender more than half their country to German occupation; to give up arms, munitions, fleet and planes; to allow the Germans to demobilize all armed forces except those needed to maintain order; and to bear the cost of the German occupation and Nazi administration of the occupied territories.

There was no official word today on Italy's terms as signed at Rome. But a fascist source in Switzerland said they called for Italian occupation of France's Mediterranean coast and eventual creation of a buffer state from maritime Alpine territory including Savoy, Nice and part of Dauphine.

Pétain Govt. Ignored
A British spokesman said the German terms made France virtually a passive ally of Germany in her impending attack on Britain. The British government announced it could "no longer regard the Bordeaux government (of Premier Marshal Henri Philippe Pétain) as the government of an independent country."

Henceforth, the British declared, they will deal with a French national committee, announced here by General Charles De Gaulle, "in all matters concerning the prosecution of the war so long as that committee continues to represent all French elements resolved to fight the common enemy."

De Gaulle's headquarters reported today it was receiving a constant stream of Frenchmen from all walks of life and there was a flood of telephone calls and cable messages backing his stand.

FRANCE ANSWERS BRITISH CRITICISM: APPEALS TO U. S.

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A member of the French government, in an appeal for understanding in the United States, declared today that France's decision to seek peace with Germany and Italy was taken with full independence of action.

The statement disavowed all former members of the government who fled the country and urged Frenchmen not to continue resistance by forming a factional government in London which, it declared, would only create disunion.

(This apparently was in reference to the French national committee, whose formation in England was announced last night by Gen. Charles De Gaulle, former under-secretary of war in Premier Reynaud's cabinet.)

The statement attacked "the present British failure to understand," and claimed that when the French first advised the British they would have to seek an armistice, Prime Minister Churchill told Paul Reynaud, then premier, that Britain "would understand."

Understanding Asked
The government indicated the change in Britain's attitude was due partly to former French Minister of the Interior Mandel, who tried to make Britain insist that France must carry on at all costs.

In a seven-page explanation, the member of the government said: "We ask our friends in America to try to understand France's immense sadness. We do not seek to hide the errors of our country."

"We regret that certain members of the British government criticize us unjustly. We wish our English friends to respect our conscience and examine their own conscience."

The minister asserted that Britain, before the war, had promised to send into France 26 divisions (some 350,000 men) during the first month's hostilities. Instead, he declared, while France kept men 48 years old under arms, Britain had not yet mobilized men of 28.

French Alpine forces were weakened both in morale by the armistice negotiations and in number by the movement of many reserves toward Mediterranean ports, where they hoped to get transportation to North Africa to continue the fight. Reports said they were trying to reach the naval base of Toulon.

The garrisons of French forts high in the Alps, however, met the attacks with fierce resistance.

William D. Henscott, who brought back this word: "He read every line; but there is no comment."

Of paramount concern to the United States was what might be done with French possessions in the western hemisphere. On that point the London dispatches offered no enlightenment.

Bills Await Approval
Awaiting the chief executive at the white house were several bills, just approved by congress, comprising an integral part of the defense program. They were due for prompt presidential scrutiny.

One was an emergency appropriation of \$1,769,000,000 to finance the acquisition of additional planes, guns, tanks and other vital equipment for the army and navy.

Another was a measure to raise \$3,000,000,000 a year in revenue to help finance huge defense outlays and to hike the national debt limit from \$45,000,000,000 to \$49,000,000,000.

With congress in recess until the republicans finish their candidate picking, the president was expected to give increased attention to amplification of plans for non-American "economic defense" and for non-military training of American youth.

G.O.P. Convention Opens; Willkie Trend Gaining

ant First Presbyterian church of Washington, D. C., prayed that a "spirit of charity" prevail over the convention and that it be dedicated "new upon the altar of our nation's welfare."

Welcomed by Mayor
Mayor Robert E. Lamberton welcomed the convention to Philadelphia. He told the delegates that "from a political viewpoint," they would "be among friends."

"The city," Lamberton said, "has not elected a democratic mayor within my memory and Pennsylvania in that time has elected a democratic governor but once."

The convention rushed through the routine formalities of approving the temporary roll of delegates and electing temporary officers, including Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota, as temporary chairman and keynote speaker. Stassen's keynote address will be heard at tonight's session, opening at 8:30.

Willkie Strength Mounting
A new Wendell Willkie invasion of another candidate's camp developed today.

A bloc of 14 favorable to Wendell Willkie developed in the big Pennsylvania delegation of 72 which was pledged to Governor Arthur James. Already inroads had been made by the utilities man into the forces of Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Senator Taft of Ohio.

Even the stir of ambitious candidates, however, did not entirely wipe out the serious men which delegates brought into their convention hall. The impact of the wars abroad had made itself felt not only upon the leaders, worried over a platform, but upon the rank and file of delegates.

The fresh Willkie support developed when Frank J. Harris, of Pittsburgh, leader of the western Pennsylvania group, said 14 delegates with whom Willkie had breakfast, probably would swing from James to Willkie after the first or second ballot.

While the convention was in session, former Senator Daniel O. Hastings of Delaware, called on Willkie downtown and afterward told reporters the utilities executive would have "100 or more" votes on the first ballot. He said three of Delaware's six delegates would be Willkie's on the first.

Northwest May Go Over
The Washington delegate to the convention is still largely in the Dewey column but some of the members watching the growing Willkie sentiment, believe the delegation should recognize the trend.

Although few Pacific northwest delegates are willing to concede Willkie more than a longshot chance of obtaining the presidential nomination several Washington delegates are of the opinion the state should have at least one Willkie supporter close to his

headquarters "just in case."

While the majority of the Washington delegation is holding tight for Dewey at least five of the 15 votes are scattered among Taft, Vandenberg and McNary.

The Idaho delegation indicated it intended to stick with Dewey as long as there is any chance of his being nominated while the majority of the Oregon delegation will retain their allegiance to McNary until released. Two members of the Oregon delegation favor Willkie and one Dewey after the first ballot.

From the headquarters of Senator Taft of Ohio came a statement attributed to Samuel E. Boys of Plymouth, Ind., Willkie's native state, which said "Willkie won't suit a lot of republicans." He listed two reasons: that Willkie was a former democrat and that he is a utilities man. Boys is a newspaper editor.

Refugee Children May Be Brought to United States

WASHINGTON, June 22.—(AP)—Three government departments and a congressional committee are exploring the possibility of bringing thousands of English refugee children to the United States.

The British government already is selecting boys and girls from 5 to 16 years of age whose parents would consent to their removal to America, said Miss Katherine Lennox, chief of the U. S. children's bureau.

NEW YORK, June 22.—(AP)—Two thousand persons throughout the United States have indicated willingness to shelter refugee children from Europe in their own homes, a newly formed committee announced today.
