

New Charges Hit Building Industry

Conspiracy to Ban Oregon and Washington Products Set Forth at San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 27.—(AP)—The seventh of a series of indictments in the building trades industry was returned here yesterday by a special federal grand jury, the latest charging conspiracy between unions and manufacturers of lumber fixtures and mill work.

In general the indictments charge that the labor unions and manufacturers in the San Francisco bay area conspired to prevent mill products from being brought in from Washington and Oregon.

Named in the indictments were the Lumber Products association, Inc., of San Francisco and its eight member companies; Wood Products, Inc., of Oakland, and its 13 members; Commercial Fixtures and Store Front Institute of San Francisco and Oakland, and its 12 members; the San Francisco and Alameda building trades council and the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America and its local unions.

All of the firms named are located in San Francisco and Oakland except the Pacific Manufacturing company of Santa Clara and the Redwood Manufacturers company of Pittsburg, Calif. Also indicted were 39 individuals, all officials of the unions, associations and companies.

The indictments charge that the unions obtained concessions from manufacturers and employers and agreed to handle mill work made only in the bay area, thus fixing and stabilizing prices.

It was charged that the agreement worked against the manufacturers of Oregon and Washington where larger and better equipped mills located close to the source of supply could produce better products at a cheaper price.

Also, it was charged that the mill work manufacturers of the bay area are not and have not been equipped to produce economically and efficiently and to turn out a product of as high a quality as the mills of Oregon and Washington.

The indictments were returned before Federal Judge St. Sure, who issued warrants for all the 39 individuals and companies and set bail at \$1,000 each.

Douglas Scenes to Be Bid to Tourists

SALEM, June 26.—(Special)—Outstanding attractions of Douglas county will be featured in displays arranged for in Detroit, Cleveland, St. Louis and other travel centers this summer by Harold B. Say, director of the travel and information department of the Oregon state highway commission, who is now in the mid-west.

Prominent Douglas county scenes include those of Diamond lake and of steelhead and chinook salmon fishing on the Umpqua.

These displays will be in the form of illuminated transparencies,

enlarged photographs and kindred material placed in attractively dressed windows of motor clubs and other travel bureaus.

U. S. Begins Buying Tin, Rubber for Defense Plan

WASHINGTON, June 27.—(AP)—Jesse H. Jones, federal lending administrator, began negotiating for huge quantities of rubber and tin for American national defense today a few hours after President Roosevelt signed a new law giving the reconstruction finance corporation wide lending powers for defense purposes.

Jones introduced to reporters, at a press conference, Sir John Hay, representing the "International rubber regulating committee," which controls virtually all rubber production and sale throughout the world.

Sir John said that he and Jones were discussing first a plan to increase production of rubber, particularly in British and Dutch possessions in the East Indies and Malay states, to assure enough rubber to fill United States needs.

Attack Reprisals Promised by Eden

LONDON, June 26.—(AP)—War Minister Anthony Eden warned Britain tonight that "enemy bombing attacks at night will be continued and possibly other forms of attack will be attempted."

But, he declared: "They will be repulsed!"

"We shall subject the enemy in his own country to constant and heavy counter-attack from the air," Eden said.

"We are confident that the enemy will be beaten off."

"Those over whom the iron wheels of the conqueror have passed base their hopes on our victory."

"We shall not fall them."

Eden emphasized the government's "stay-where-you-are" instructions to civilians, explaining: "Refugees on the roads are the outward signs that the enemy has succeeded in creating the conditions for military success. The mass of refugees helped to lose the battle of France. They will not lose the battle of Britain."
