

Project Includes Roseburg History

Although Roseburg once celebrated an annual rose and strawberry festival, the city did not receive its name from the popular flower but was named to honor Aaron Rose, settler of 1851, according to the state's first complete guidebook, "Oregon: End of the Trail," written by the WPA Oregon Writers' project under the sponsorship of the Oregon state board of control. Roseburg's history from the time it was a settlement called Deer Creek to the present is reviewed in the four sections of the Oregon Guide, which contains a log of the principal highways as well as the history and lore of the communities along the routes.

Roseburg is found on Tour 2, which crosses the state from the Washington state line to California. In addition to the tour descriptions, the guidebook contains a review of Oregon history, a wealth of general information of state-wide interest, maps of the state and leading cities and 125 photographic illustrations.

"Oregon: End of the Trail" is one of the American Guide series of travel books written by WPA Writers' projects for the territorial possessions and states of the union. Oregon's volume, written with both tourist and arm-chair traveler in mind, follows the series pattern in giving a complete picture of the state. The Oregon Guide was published by Binford and Mori of Portland.

Hitler Visits Paris to See Tomb of Napoleon

BERLIN, June 26.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler paid an extended incognito visit to Paris yesterday and visited the tomb of Napoleon, a highly reliable source said today.

Hitler is known to admire greatly the French emperor. Apparently moved, he stood for a while in the big rotunda whence one gazes down at the tomb, then walked to the memorial table on which Napoleon is quoted as follows:

"I desire that my ashes rest at the banks of the Seine among the French people whom I loved so dearly."

Both as he arrived and as he left German guards standing before the gates presented arms while the French guards used to stand.

The German fuhrer also visited the Eiffel tower. He stood apparently deeply impressed by its grace.

Exports Would Fall Off

Europe, then, would buy in the world market only where it could sell an equal amount in return. It needs huge quantities of farm products and other raw materials. American agricultural exports would drop to an all-time low. The farm surplus problem, which has cost the government hundreds of millions in the last seven years, would become ever so much worse. Cotton, wheat, corn, tobacco—all would be terrifically affected. A huge acreage would have to be retired from production. Farm prices would go way down.

Along with this, all industries which are on an export basis would decline sharply; and the decline in farm buying power would hit the other industries which do not depend on foreign markets.

Gloomy Picture Presented

The result would be, as economists here see it, a lower national income, much greater subsidies for agriculture, heavier spending for relief, probably some elaborate rural-work-relief program . . . plus the new heavier spending on defense. Hand in hand with that would go, either an ever-mounting government deficit, or drastically increased taxes—or, possibly, some of both.

Furthermore, with world trade on a barter basis, the United States would have to set up fairly strict production controls in order to conduct any foreign trade at all. Setting up such controls, establishing huge government corporations to handle the trade, doing all of this in a declining market in the face of continued depression at home—all of this, it is suggested, would be impossible unless the United States adopted for use at home at least some of the methods of the totalitarians.

It makes a gloomy picture. Probably you can see flaws in it; doubtless there are plenty of economists who will disagree with it. But it does help to explain why this administration is so very anxious that Hitler be beaten.

Coffin Within Status of Couch, Van Winkle Rules

SALEM, June 27.—(AP)—A coffin is a "cushioned or pillowed place for reclining, thus coming within the term of 'couch' or 'divan,'" Attorney General L. H. Van Winkle ruled yesterday in holding that mattresses and pillows in caskets must be labeled under state board of health regulations.

Van Winkle explained the law makes no distinction whether mattresses or pillows are to be used for living or dead persons, and that a "casket or coffin is lined and cushioned on the inside so as to bring it within the term 'upholstered furniture'."

Nazi Triumph Would be Blow To U. S. Trade

WASHINGTON, June 4.—This administration's deep desire to see the allies win the war is by no means due solely to a fear of further German aggression.

Equally important, probably, is the belief that the economic consequences of a sweeping German victory would be little less than catastrophic to the United States.

This is a subject which has been publicly discussed very little. Under the surface, however, it is getting a great deal of attention. Elaborate studies are being made. And in all this there is being filled in the picture of a world which would be so radically changed by a Hitler triumph that the survival of American democracy itself might be in question.

Here, in brief, is the way some of the new deal economists see it:

Assuming a victory which would mean German dominance of Europe, the first consequence would be extreme regimentation of international trade. What is left of "normal" trade would go on a barter basis.

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Europe, then, would buy in the world market only where it could sell an equal amount in return. It needs huge quantities of farm products and other raw materials. Instead of buying them from the United States, it would be far more likely to buy them from non-industrial nations, like those of South America, which could take its own manufactured goods in equal quantity in return.

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Furthermore, with world trade on a barter basis, the United States would have to set up fairly strict production controls in order to conduct any foreign trade at all. Setting up such controls, establishing huge government corporations to handle the trade, doing all of this in a declining market in the face of continued depression at home—all of this, it is suggested, would be impossible unless the United States adopted for use at home at least some of the methods of the totalitarians.

In the melee an unidentified person received a cut head.

Delegates Wesley B. Bartine of Aberdeen and George E. Brown of Spokane, failing to rescue the alternate standard in the first lap of the parade, took up a vantage point between the chairs and pounced on the standard when Smith came by.

The standard was smashed to bits and the unidentified person was led away by policemen in the

battle joined in by several other persons.

Chairman Nat Brown and Delegate Cameron Sherwood of Walla Walla kept the state's main standard from being placed in the parade by Willkie supporters.

Oregon, Idaho Stay Out

The Oregon and Idaho standards were kept out of the parade by the protective work of Walter Tooe, Portland, and Stanley Easton, Kellogg.

While Idahoans and the majority of the Washingtonians took an active part in the Dewey demonstration, Oregonians likewise prevented their standard from entering the demonstration.

The Oregonians were hiding their time for their own demonstration today when Sen. Charles McNary's name is placed before the convention.

Tooe, Henry Collier, Portland, and K. K. Kuhl, Portland, guarded the Oregon standard during the Dewey demonstration.

Ralph Horr of Seattle was the

only member of the Pacific north-west delegation to join the Taft

parade, carrying a banner and blowing a whistle. Ray Kendall of Wenatchee led the Washington parade during the Dewey festivities. He carried the banner while other members carried Dewey pictures tucked to sticks.

Metropolitan Eugene's Census Set at 31,249

EUGENE, June 26.—(AP)—Metropolitan Eugene has a population of 31,249, figures released from the district census office today revealed.

Although only 20,529 live within the confining city limits, 10,710 more reside just across the boundary in outlying precincts and Springfield.

Eugene, itself, showed an eight per cent increase in the past decade.

Teach Patriotism, Gov. Sprague Urges

SALEM, June 27.—(AP)—Educators can best participate in America's national defense program by transforming the schools into "little dynamos of patriotism," Gov. Charles A. Sprague said yesterday in an extemporaneous address opening the annual conference of Oregon county school superintendents.

"The schools should not become victims of a psychological blitzkrieg which would turn them into armed camps," the governor said.

"The only service which schools can provide during these times is to teach rudiments of education, teaching the students loyalty to country so they may contribute when they mature."

"It is fine that we have a moral unity among ourselves. When the

welfare of our common land is at stake, we must forget our individual differences and rally to support our common cause."

Speaking of his program to bring about consolidation of school districts, the governor said "we are making some progress," but he added progress has been slow because there is a "conflict between economy and efficiency on the one hand and social attitudes on the other."
