

Sixth Ballot Gives Willkie Nomination

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early balloting. Then his drive went into the camps of the men who three weeks ago had been favored to win the nomination.

First Dewey's lines began to tremble and crack. Dewey released his delegates on the fifth ballot, and there was a drive for Taft, with the workers of Herbert Hoover aiding in the push. But it failed.

Wins on 6th Ballot

The thousands in the galleries, hoarse from hours of shouting "we want Willkie," took up the chant again. Delegates that hesitated or turned against Willkie were booed; then cheered to a raucous echo when they turned back to him.

His nomination went over in the middle of the sixth roll call of the longest nominating fight the republicans have had since Warren G. Harding was nominated in 1920. Once, as the lines tightened, a delegate sought to move a recess. But Chairman Martin drove them ahead.

When 998 of the 1,000 delegates there were two absentees—had been recorded for the new candidate, Martin allowed a motion for unanimity to be put. It was carried with an echoing roar of ayes.

Oregonians Seesaw

Delegates from the three Pacific northwest states and Alaska fought against the nomination of Willkie until the bitter end last night. Oregon and Washington even requiring roll calls by the convention chairman to settle arguments as to whom they were voting for after Willkie's nomination had been assured.

But when the smoke of battle cleared members of the delegates praised the presidential nominee and promised their support.

The Oregonians had trouble making up their minds on the final ballot but finally climbed aboard the bandwagon with the unanimous count. The first announcement on the sixth ballot was Willkie's.

Chairman Walter L. Towner then demanded the delegation be polled. This vote showed Willkie 7, Taft 3. After Willkie was nominated Towner asked that the Oregon vote be tabulated as unanimous. Oregon had supported its favorite son, Sen. Charles McNary, for three ballots. On the fourth ballot W. T. Sawyer changed to Dewey and Walter Norblad to Willkie. Sawyer switched back to McNary on the fifth ballot.

Willkie States Views
Talking to reporters today Willkie said in answer to questions: Formal notification ceremonies of nomination will probably take place at Elwood, Ind., his birthplace.

Congress should stay in session because of "the difficult international situation."

"The outstanding issues" of the forthcoming campaign would be "national unity, building an adequate national defense and rehabilitation of the national economy."

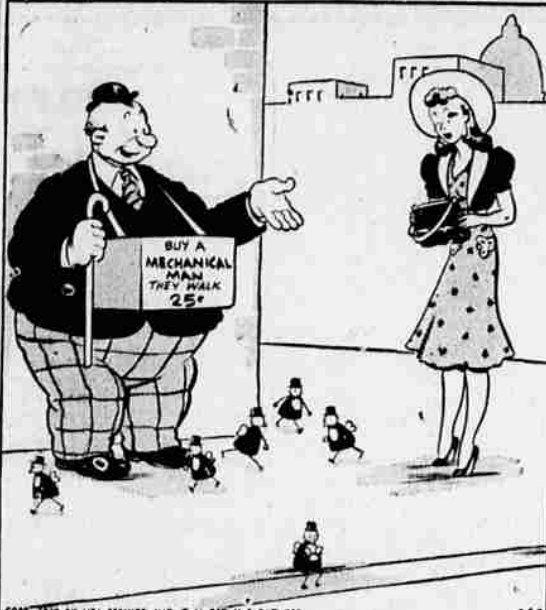
His victory was a 47-day "expression of the will of the people," and he would make a "very aggressive and widespread campaign."

He would be "delighted to see President Roosevelt" to discuss national defense, adding with a grin "I think one should be most courteous to his predecessor."

As for offering advice to Mr. Roosevelt on financial problems—"every time I have seen the president he's done most of the talking."

question that he would be glad to talk with Willkie about foreign affairs.

Will Quit Utility Job

Willkie said he intended to resign from the presidency of the Commonwealth and Southern corporation, public utility holding company, Monday.

Told that his nomination was being attributed in England as a victory for the interventionists' cause, Willkie said that was incorrect.

The nominee said that he would insist that his party adhere to the provisions of the Hatch political practices act. He declared he wanted no large contributions. He said the maximum would be \$5,000.

"I hope," he added, "that the contributions will be small and widely diffused."

Newsmen recalled that he once had described the 1932 democratic platform as the "last ever written." He still subscribes to that view, he declared.

Quickly, he emphasized however, that he was going to campaign wholeheartedly on the republican platform.

How Boom Began

Willkie gave his own answer to day to the question which has had a lot of politicians here puzzled: when did he first begin to take his presidential boom seriously.

The date, the republican nominee said, was May 11. On that day, he related, he received and accepted an invitation to speak before a meeting of Minnesota republicans at St. Paul.

The invitation, he added, was extended after he had followed that "well-known gladiator, Harold Ickes," in speaking before a meeting of publishers in New York.

Willkie, Sen. McNary Nominated by G. O. P.

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for a parliamentary challenge.

A typical "behind-the-scenes" tactician, his senate service has been marked by close association with the farm problem. For years his name was linked with the late Rep. Hansen of Iowa, in efforts to put over the familiar "McNary-Haugen" bill to control farm surpluses, a measure which President Coolidge vetoed. McNary never has given up the principle of that storm-tossed legislation.

He also was instrumental in putting through the big Bonneville and Grand Coulee power-navigation projects in the northwest, federal undertakings recommended by President Roosevelt.

Owens Farm

McNary is extremely popular in his home state. In the May primary, he got more votes for president than President Roosevelt and Vice-President Garner combined.

His friends say "Charlie isn't much of a talker, but he's a mighty good listener." When he is in his beloved Oregon, where he was born 66 years ago, he tours the state talking to farmers about their problems.

McNary is a farmer himself, owning a prize and Albert farm on the outskirts of Salem.

He has served in the senate since 1917. McNary never had much trouble being re-elected until 1936, but even then, he survived the Roosevelt landslide and won by 9,000 votes.

His two hobbies are raising flowers and playing with his five-year-old adopted daughter.

Oregon republicans had hoped that McNary would be nominated for president, expecting he would be a dark horse if Dewey and Taft became deadlocked. But the Willkie boom dashed those hopes.

Rumania, Facing New Grabs, Appeals to Hitler

said they were informed that Hitler had sent a telegram to Josef Stalin asking the soviet dictator to "meet Rumania half way."

Russian troops, heavily reinforced by tanks and planes, poured across the Rumanian frontier shortly after dawn—swiftly following up the Russian ultimatum to Rumania which expired at 10 p. m. yesterday—and occupied four cities in the ceded provinces of Bessarabia and Bucovina.

It was not immediately known whether King Carol appealed to Hitler for actual military help to combat the soviet invasion or merely asked the German fuhrer to intercede diplomatically for modern-

tion of Russia's stiff demands.

The king had yielded "in principle" to the soviet ultimatum two hours before its expiration, but had pleaded for time to negotiate.

A few minutes before a soviet ultimatum expired yesterday King Carol agreed to give up Bessarabia, northern Bucovina, and rights in important Black sea ports.

There were indications that the axis partners gave silent consent to dismemberment of the country. Rumania's neighbors clamored that their claims, too, must be heeded. Hungary wants Rumania's large western province of Transylvania. Bulgaria claims southern Dobruja.

Turkey sent warships into the Black sea; Yugoslavia reinforced the guard on her Italian border.

At the same time Turkey spurred the mobilization of her army past the 500,000 mark.

Informed circles said the government had completed a plan to double the number of men under arms within 24 hours should it be necessary.

BRITISH TRICK SEEN BY NAZIS IN RUSSIAN GRAB

BUCHAREST, June 28.—(AP)—Soviet Russia's swift, bloodless acquisition of a huge expanse of Rumanian territory was labeled by German legation officials today as a British trick to make Germany fight on a new warfront in the Balkans.

But, they declared, Germany is carefully staying out of any such trap.

They declared frankly that German diplomats had advised King Carol to meet Moscow's demands but had told him that relinquishing of the territory was only "a temporary adjustment," and that Germany "definitely will settle things later."

There was every indication that the soviet ultimatum and advance into Bessarabia and Bucovina took the Germans completely by surprise.

Wealthy German landowners and German experts employed in the territory now being occupied by the red army fled to Bucharest late last night and early today like ordinary refugees, without any warning.

British Envoy Blamed
The legation quarters declared bitterly that Russia had moved and abetted by Britain to take advantage of German preoccupation in the west with the war with Britain.

These Germans alleged that the British ambassador to Moscow, Sir Stafford Cripps, had "pushed" Stalin into Rumania in an attempt to create a new embarrassment for Germany and to cause the reich to turn her attention away from the west.

They asserted that Germany would not be fooled by this maneuver at this time.

They declared openly that the reich cannot permanently permit the soviet to dominate the mouth of the Danube and northern Bucovina because of the potential long-range military danger and the possibility open to Russia to block Germany's approaches to the Black sea.

Bessarabia has an area of 17,146 square miles, with a population of 3,000,000. Nine hundred thousand persons live in Bucovina, which has an area of 4620 square miles.

Germany's reply to any peace feelers from London is an unequivocal statement that "cannons are speaking," authorized sources said today.

These sources declared that if certain British circles are endeavoring to bring about peaceful settlements with Germany, these overtures are of no account to the reich so long as British Prime Minister Winston Churchill's government keeps saying it wants war to a bitter finish.

"That is the war we are giving them," these sources said.

For their part, the Germans reported successful air bombardments on armament plants and port facilities in southern and central England last night.

Today is a double anniversary for embattled Europe.

Twenty-six years ago Gavril Princip fired the shots that touched off the world war through the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand and his wife; twenty-one years ago Germany acceded to the treaty of Versailles ending that war.

Berlin papers took note of the latter anniversary to comment that that treaty is "now dead."

Nazi Transport Sunk
The admiralty announced today a British submarine had torpedoed and sunk a deeply-laden German transport of 8,000 tons off the south coast of Norway.

The announcement said the Tetra was counterattacked by Nazi torpedo boats and planes but escaped.

The sinking incident, though comparatively minor in itself, may have disclosed one of the first clues of the scene chosen by Hitler for his heralded invasion of England.

If the German transport was a troop ship, laden with soldiers en route to Norway, it may indicate that the Nazi fuhrer has decided on the conquered Scandinavian kingdom as a springboard for his assault.

The statement by the conservative party—the power behind the government—"categorically denied" rumors which "have lately gained currency in the United States that differences of opinion exist within the cabinet and notably within the conservative party," and concluded with the declaration that:

"There has never been a time when parliament and the nation were more united in their will to complete the task to which they have set their hand."

The ministry of health today announced that the "possibility of evacuation for military reasons of the bulk of the civilian population of certain districts" of the British Isles is being considered.

The statement envisaging compulsory removal of civilians from areas threatened with invasion was made in a circular to authorities in London, Portsmouth and towns along the southern bank of the Thames estuary.
