## Baseball Teams Date Doubleheader

### Legion Juniors of Eugene and Roseburg Will Battle at Finlay Field Sunday.

Roseburg baseball fans will have an opportunity Sunday afternoon to see two games which are expected to furnish plenty of excitement, when the Roseburg and Eugene American Legion Junior teams tangle at Finlay field. Both games will be played by the Junior teams. The Middlets will not play as was announced previously. The first game is scheduled to start at 1:30 p. m.

Sunday's contests will mark the beginning of the season for the local team, although the games do not count in competition. However the official squad will be chosen from the players in uniform Sunday and work will be started with the 18 boys retained on the roster in preparation for the series of games with Medford and Marshfield for the district championship.

Coach Hod Turner has been giving the players some very breezy workouts, and fans have observed a very great improvement in playing ability since the start of the practice season.

The team will be limited from now on to the 18 players permitted on each squad by the state rules, and Coach Turner plans to concentrate efforts to build the squad as rapidly as possible into a strong fielding and hitting aggregation.

Team's Prospects Bright This year's team has prospects of going far in the state competition. The boys for the most part are of good size and have had some experience. The infield is very strong and fast, but there is considerable weakness in the outfield. Several shifts are contemplated, however, to strengthen the field defense. The signing of Dyer, Myrtle Creek southpaw, to aid Applegate and Cox in the hurling department adds considerably to the mound strength.

One of the brightest spots on the local team is behind the plate, where Pleunard, of Oakland, is developing rapidly into one of the best catchers to be seen in Roseburg. He is performing brilliantly as a receiver and has dangerous potentialities as a hitter.

Altogether John Collins, manager, and Coach Turner are well pleased with the prospects for the season, despite the fact that competition is expected to be much tougher than for several years.

Both Medford and Marshfield, whom Roseburg must beat to stay in competition, started development of their respective squads last season. Medford won from Roseburg last year by the elimination of both having beaten Roseburg three times by the local squad, and has practically the same group of players left for this year. For the current season, however, play will be based on a percentage of six games for each team, rather than upon straight eliminations as here before. Such will give allowances for "off" days, such as beat the Roseburg team last year.

BOSTON, June 29.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "The wool market here has been gradually subsiding all the week. Quotations are largely unchanged on Summer street, compared with a week ago, but are slightly lower in the far west. The volume of business done both here and in the west has been slight. Some fine and fine medium wools of average to choice type have been sold in New Mexico at prices equivalent to 78.84 cents, clean basis, Boston, off two cents for the week. Most mid-west holders want 40 cents or better delivered mill for medium country-packed wools but 39 cents is the top bid at the moment.
