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tion to speed up the defense program. Officials estimated that this legislation, enabling the navy to negotiate contracts without competitive bidding, would result in savings of \$16,000,000 to \$17,000,000—the cost of a cruiser.

Included in the construction ordered were 11 cruisers, 20 destroyers, 12 submarines and one large seaplane tender.

While the navy defense program was thus expedited, the army also geared up its work to high speed and commanders started doing their bit by paying higher taxes on beer, liquor and cigarettes.

Intensive specialized training began for selected army officers and men. Numerous reserve officers, mostly youthful lieutenants, reported for active duty with troops, and long-deferred promotions took effect for hundreds of regular army officers.

American consumers began to pay paying taxes for the nation's five-year five-billion-dollar rearmament fund.

In several instances, they will pay more than during the world war.

Excise, commodity and service taxes advance from 10 to 25 percent on various items from present rates.

An additional 11 per cent on beer will add a third of a cent per bottle; an extra 75 cents per gallon on liquor will add 19 cents per quart; and 25 cents more on each 2,000 cigarettes will add half a cent to each standard package of 20.

The gasoline tax jumps from 1 to 1 1/2 cents; radios, from 5 to 5 1/2 per cent of their value; passenger cars, from 3 to 3 1/2 per cent; and up on for 30 odd other items.

Amusement admission taxes begin at 21 cents, instead of 41. The scale of 1 cent for each 10 cents of admission price continues. A total of 2,200,000 new income tax payers join the 2,200,000 to whom the government already sends "please remit" notices every March 15.

They are made subject to tax on their 1940 incomes as a result of lowering the personal exemptions of married persons from \$2,500 to \$2,000 and of single persons from \$1,000 to \$800.

In addition, a "super-tax" of 15 per cent of the normal income is imposed.

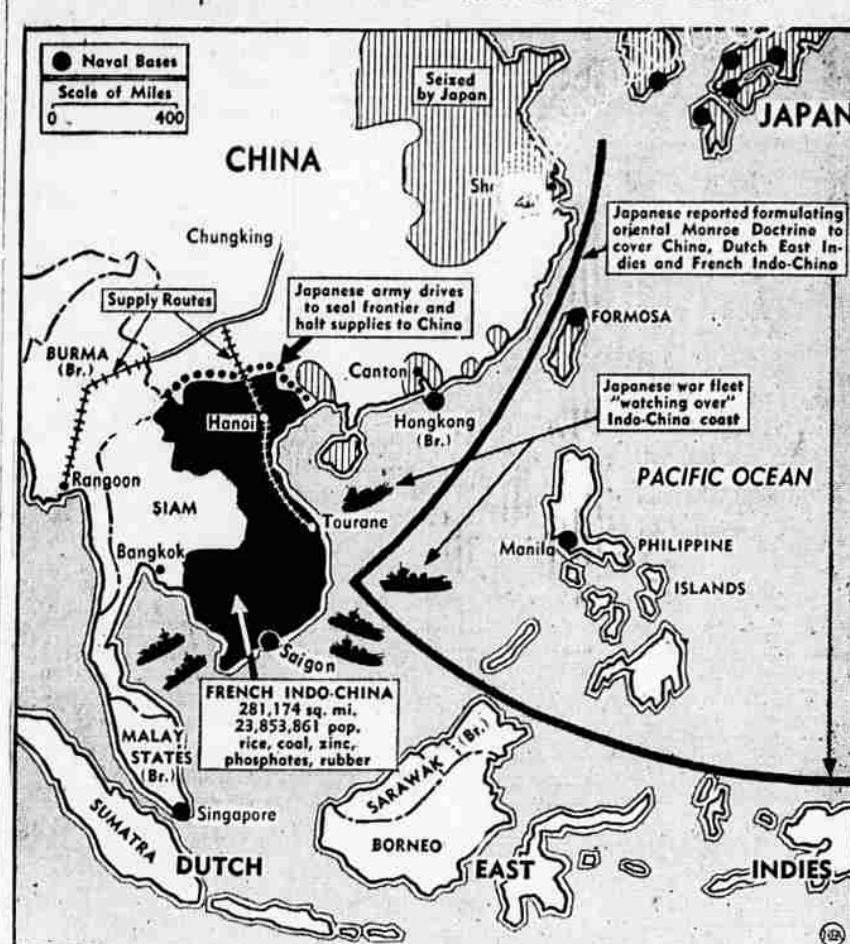

news agency announcement that "the general impression is that Rumania is on the point of collapse."

The official agency's announcement that Rumania apparently is crumbling was linked with the consistently reiterated official view that such a collapse would call for the immediate entry of the Hungarian army into Transylvania to protect a Magyar minority there of almost 2,000,000.

Late this afternoon the Hungarian foreign office issued documents which stressed that the "historic mission" of Hungary is to defend "western Latin civilization against any attacks coming from the east."

The documents declared that Hungary had "for centuries fought and bled for the western Latin culture" and attempted to prove that Transylvania must return to Hungary as its rightful owner.

Hungary claims the full support of both Germany and Italy for any march into Rumania in the event Soviet Russia's armies overrun the limits of ceded territory—Bessarabia and northern Bucovina—established in the agreement between Rumania and Russia.

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that the attackers must have been in considerable numbers.

The Nazi high command also reported a British cruiser of the Orion class (about 7,200 tons) was torpedoed south of Bristol, France, and that a German U-boat sank 23,000 tons of enemy merchant shipping.

"Two of the stolen steamers were torpedoed from a strongly protected convoy," the communiqué said.

Chamberlain Warlike
British sources said German industrial life was being so hampered by RAF bombers that many factories had suspended night shifts.

Former Prime Minister Chamberlain, telling the empire to disregard rumors of disunity in the British government, warned that a Nazi invasion might come at any moment.

But if it does, insisted the man who tried to appease Adolf Hitler in September, 1938, the British will fight until they or the Germans are "utterly destroyed."

Germany staged a new air raid on Britain, in which a thickly populated area of northeast Scotland was reported bombed, and Nazi planes ranged widely over England and Wales. The British government said there were "no serious damage or casualties."

This past midnight raid followed British claims to having captured an Italian initiative with a series of night attacks on Germany.

A flurry of land and air fighting over the weekend on the Libyan-Egyptian border indicated a faster tempo to the war in the Mediterranean area.

The Italian high command reported the capture of several British positions, with attacks by British motorized units reported beaten off. The clashes were officially described as "considerable."

Reports from Khartoum said two British armored cars knifed through Italian defenses on the Eritrea border in East Africa and routed 1,200 cavalrymen with heavy casualties.

LONDON, July 1.—(AP)—Britain today claimed double success in aerial warfare with Germany, in downing a flock of Messerschmitt fighters in France and driving off Nazi raiders stabbing sporadically at the island kingdom.

British fighters ranging over France bagged five Messerschmitts and "probably" destroyed another seven, said the air ministry.

(The German high command declared 18 British planes had been shot down in a series of raids over Germany.)

Air defenders of the British Isles shot down one bomber and drove off the rest of the Nazi raiders flying over in forays which Neville Chamberlain warned were only the forerunners of a coming attempt at invasion.
