N. Umpqua Road to Be Open July 4th
The North Umpqua road from Roseburg to Diamond lake will be open for travel at all hours on Thursday, July 4, V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua National forest, reported today. The road is kept open for public travel every Saturday and Sunday and on all holidays.

On other days the 10-mile Copeland creek section is closed between 8 a. m. and 4 p. m. while work is in progress, but is open to travel from 4 p. m. to 8 a. m.

The section from Roseburg to Copeland creek and the section from Diamond lake to Big Camas are open at all hours every day at the week-end. The only portion upon which travel is restricted in the 10-mile Copeland creek section between the mouth of that creek and the Big Camas ranger station. Work will be in progress there for the greater part of the summer, and until the road has been brought to standard, the workday restrictions will be continued, Mr. Harpham states.
