City Asked to Join In Sugar Homage

Establishment of a sugar industry in the state of Oregon is to be widely celebrated this month. The week of July 21 to August 3 is to be set aside for statewide observance as Oregon Sugar Time in recognition of the activities of the Amalgamated Sugar company in setting up its new industry at Nyssa, Oregon.

W. F. Harris, president of the Roseburg city council, acting in the absence of Mayor A. J. Young, has issued a proclamation urging that Roseburg residents join in the state-wide appreciation of the industry. His proclamation is as follows:

WHEREAS, there has been instituted in Oregon a beet sugar industry which promises this year to produce approximately five million dollars in new wealth for the state of Oregon; and

WHEREAS, the revenue from this new industry will be widely distributed in direct payments to Oregon farmers, in local, state and federal taxes, in field and factory payrolls and for the purchase of supplies and in distribution costs; and

WHEREAS, this industry, being of benefit to the State of Oregon as a whole, is of much importance to the City of Roseburg; and

WHEREAS, it is most fitting that the City of Roseburg salute the Amalgamated Sugar company and the City of Nyssa, where the product "White Satin" sugar is produced; now

THEREFORE I HEREBY PROCLAIM for the City of Roseburg the two-week period from July 21 to August 3 as "Oregon Sugar Time," and urge the residents of Roseburg to show their appreciation of this important new industry.

16 Labor Heads to Aid Defense Plans

WASHINGTON, July 3.—(AP)—Sixteen labor leaders representing the AFL, the CIO and the Railroad Brotherhoods, it was learned today, have been called in to serve as an advisory committee on labor policy under the national defense program.

The committee met yesterday with Sidney Hillman, the labor representative on the national defense commission, to begin shaping labor policies to be followed by the commission in pushing the preparedness program.

The establishment of the labor advisory committee brings together AFL and CIO leaders who have been on opposite sides of the fence throughout the AFL-CIO warfare.

From some leaders came suggestions that the two sides working together on defense problems might be able to piece out a settlement of the four-year-old labor split.

Oregon Liquor Drinkers Now Forced to Pay More

SALEM, Ore., July 3.—(UP)—Oregon liquor drinkers are paying an average of 30 cents a quart more for their drinks although the new federal levy now in effect is only 75 cents a gallon.

The liquor commission said the difference between the federal tax and the \$1.20 the state applied its price is due to the commission's policy of adding a 10 per cent markup over cost on all sales.

The percentage of markup over the increased cost remains the same although there is an actual money increase of 15 cents a gallon over the federal tax that the customer is paying.

J. N. Chambers, Salem member of the commission, said that a reduction in prices would probably be made by liquor manufacturers soon to offset decreases in sales resulting from the higher prices. Chambers added that these reductions would be passed on to the customers.

Most of the suspensions and revocations were ordered because of drunken driving. There were two revocations for involuntary manslaughter and one for hit and run driving.

Spirituality Needed in Defense, Perry Smith Says

Armaments alone are not sufficient in the defense of America, the Rev. Perry Smith, rector of St. George's Episcopal church, 1670 the Roseburg Kwanis club at its regular Tuesday luncheon program. Speaking on the subject, "Making America Great," the Rev. Mr. Smith declared that along with other defense measures the nation must maintain spirituality. Spiritual ideals, he said, are necessary to bind a people together and promote national strength.

"To make America great," he said, "we must make America strong, free and forward looking, and, above all, a Christian nation."

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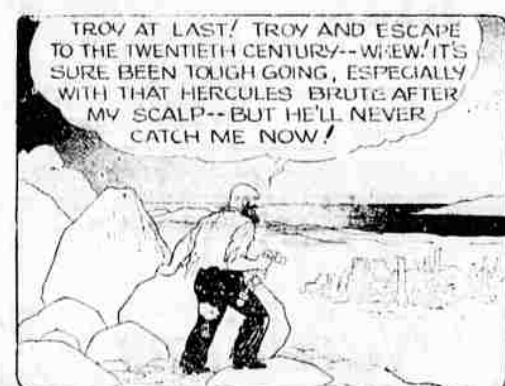
