Sprague Denies Aspiration For U. S. Senate Job

SALEM, July 5.—(AP)—Governor Charles A. Sprague said today he isn't even thinking about whom he would appoint to succeed Senator McNary if the senator is elected vice president.

"I'm not going to rush into the matter," the governor said. "While I'm very optimistic about McNary's chances to be elected, I'm not going to give the matter of his successor any thought for a long time yet."

The governor's remarks followed a statement in which he emphatically denied reports of a "deal" whereby the governor would succeed McNary in the senate. The reports were that as soon as McNary resigned, Governor Sprague would resign, turning his position over to Speaker of the House Ernest R. Falland. Falland then would appoint Sprague senator.

In his statement, the governor said "public sentiment frowns on politics of that sort," and he added "I have no intention to resign as governor and have no present aspirations for any other public office."

Reporters recalled the governor had criticized similar "deals" in other states where governors had had themselves appointed senators. In regard to such an arrangement in Kentucky, the governor had commented he expected that because "in Kentucky they have no political morals."
