

Mrs. Susan Roots Passes On at 94

Mrs. Susan Ann Roots, 94, well-known resident of Roseburg, died at her home at 508 North Pine street this morning, following a short period of illness.

She was born at Petersburg, Ill., June 7, 1846, and was first married to Albert L. White at Athens, Ill., in 1865. On September 15, 1888, at Centralia, Kan., she was married to Ernest Roots. Mr. Roots died about 23 years ago.

Mrs. Roots moved to Cottage Grove, Ore., from Alberta, Canada, in 1920, and made her home in that city until about ten years ago, when she came to Roseburg, where she had since resided. She was a member of the Methodist church.

Surviving are a son, Charles F. White; two grandsons, Charles J. and Francis S. White all of Roseburg; and two great grandchildren, Eunice P. White, Eugene, Ore., and Robert White of Roseburg.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Douglas Funeral home Monday, July 8, at 10:30 a. m., Rev. Melville T. Wire of the Methodist church officiating. Interment will follow in the Civil Bend cemetery. Arrangements are in charge of the Douglas Funeral home.

British Naval Attack Strains Bond of Allies

An Italian source said that as a result of Britain's action both continental and colonial France henceforth will attack British vessels coming within the 12-mile coastal limits.

Yesterday both Britain and French ships at Alexandria blazed away in unison at raiding Italian planes.

British naval sources there declined to say whether French Vice-Admiral Godfrey, commanding the units at Alexandria, had been given any definite time to make his decision.

It was understood, the alternative to fighting with the British were the same as those handed the French at Mers El-Kebir.

Usually well-informed sources, meantime, declared that the majority of the French officers and seamen want to fight on with Great Britain against Italy and Germany.

While the British acted decisively to prevent the French fleet from aiding Hitler's projected invasion of the British Isles, German and Italian warplanes yesterday sniped at two British naval bases.

Italian planes twice showered bombs on Alexandria, England's great base in the Mediterranean, attacking both French and British warships at anchor in the harbor. The toll: 15 killed, 7 wounded.

A German raid on England's home naval base at Portland, on the southwest coast, killed 11 civilians.

Raiders later roved over sections of England during the night, but the government said damage was "very slight" and no casualties were reported.

A German bomber attempting after daylight to cross the English coast was driven out to sea and shot down in flames.

The Nazi high command reported that German U-boats, in a new outburst of unrelenting warfare, had sunk 86,543 tons of British merchant shipping, while Nazi speed boats torpedoed two armed British steamers, totalling 12,400 tons and "shot" two others totalling 20,000 tons, and German dive bombers sank four 5,000-ton transports—a grand total of 138,943 tons.

New Soviet claims in the European conflict meanwhile grew more obscure.

New columns of red army troops and mechanized equipment were reported arriving in Bessarabia, the Rumanian province seized by Russia last week, thereby strengthening the belief that Stalin is planning further demands on the harassed little Italian kingdom.

Considerable mystery still clings to the Soviet grab in the Balkans and the Baltic as well, with some observers interpreting them as moves to counter Germany's sweeping conquest of half Europe.

Britons found a comforting warmth in this theory, hoping that eventually Russia and Germany would come to grips.

But today the Moscow newspaper Pravda, the official communist party organ, asserted that soviet moves were directed "against plans of the British-French war mongers—and not against Germany."

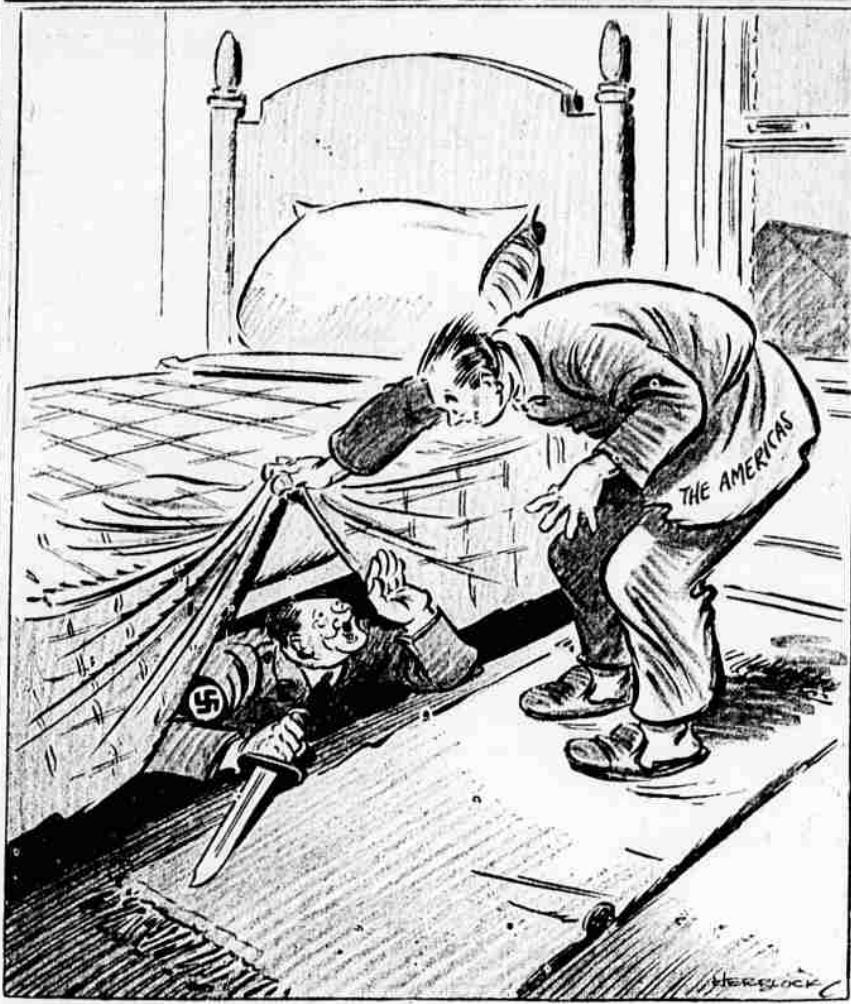
While Europe's attention centered on Britain's naval camp, Rumania lined up with Rome-Berlin axis through formation of a new nationalistic, pro-German, anti-semantic government.

King Carol, whose kingdom has been dismembered by the cession to soviet Russia of Bessarabia and northern Bucovina, yielded much of his power to the new premier, Ion Gheorghe.

The Rumanian move followed uncontrived reports that further Russian demands had been made. Control of strategic frontier bridges along the Prut and Danube rivers forming the new soviet Rumanian border was reported among the demands.

Firefighters added their bit to the critical fire situation, aggravated by an unusually long dry spell, officials estimating the majority of 25 to 30 fires started within a 50-mile radius of Seattle yesterday were caused by firecrackers. None of these fires was serious.

Washington state's most serious blaze was the Camp McDonald fire, which has covered 10,000 acres. Nearly 1,000 fire fighters drove long fire trails south and west of the burn yesterday.

The second largest fire in Washington state, a 1,000-acre blaze between Vail, Thurston county, and Alpha, Lewis county, was under control.

BUND LEADERS ARRESTED AT NEW JERSEY CAMP

AND-OVER TOWNSHIP, N. J., July 5.—(AP)—Arrested at an independence day rally at an Independence day rally at the German-American band's camp, Nordland, on charges of inciting racial and religious hatred, three bund leaders, including the acting national fuhrer, were expected to be freed on bail today following a night spent in the Sussex county jail at Newton.

C. Wilhelm Kunze, acting national leader of the band, August Klapprott, camp manager and president of the New Jersey band; and Matthias Kohler, a bund officer and trustee, were arrested by deputy sheriffs yesterday shortly before a program of speeches was to start.

The warrants for their arrest, based on a 1935 New Jersey statute, charged they "permitted or caused an assemblage of three or more persons and did permit utterance of speeches, sale of literature, display of emblems and of uniforms which counseled, promoted or advocated hatred, violence or hostility against any group or groups of persons residing in the state, because of race, religion or creed."

The law carries maximum penalties of three years in prison or \$5,000 fine or both. The arrest warrants charged violations "on and prior to June 14."

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Camp To Be Ready For Scouts July 14

The construction program at the Wolf Creek Boy Scout camp is proceeding rapidly and will be finished in ample time for the beginning of camp July 14, according to E. A. Britton, who, with W. H. Gerretsen and Wm. Parath, is in charge of the camp details.

Five sleeping cabins, 14 by 11 feet in size, each with eight built-in bunks have been finished. Mr. Britton states. A small cabin also is to be built for the use of the camp director, and a kitchen, 11 by 15 feet, will be erected this week and will be furnished with two ranges. The kitchen will have shelving, storage space and a serving counter.

Until a mess hall can be constructed, the tables and benches will be located under a canvas shelter between the kitchen and Wolf creek.

All buildings, Mr. Britton states, are of the same style, having one-half pitch shake roofs.

The camp, starting the 14th and continuing through July 28, is open to all Boy Scouts, and particularly Scouts from Douglas county. Mr. Britton states. All registrations should be made not later than Monday, July 8.

The camp program will be conducted by Robert Dill, field executive, who will be assisted by Wm. Parath and Dale Owen.

Mrs. Bertha Taylor again will serve as cook and arrangements have been made for a liberal supply of provisions, Mr. Britton reports.

OREGON COUNTS FIVE DEAD JULY FOURTH ACCIDENTS

Five persons lost their lives and many others were injured in Oregon Independence day tragedies.

A collision on the Rosewood highway south of Grants Pass cost the life of Elvira McCalvey, 75, Grants Pass, and injured six others.

The injured were Mrs. Vera Olson, daughter of the victim, broken ribs and shock; her son, Jack, 5, possible skull fracture; Albert

McCalvey, 70, broken ribs, and Raymond, Francis and Wilma Hatch. An automobile left The Dalles, California highway nine miles south of Maupin killing Mrs. M. W. Hinkle, about 34, Lees, Ore. Her husband and 11-year-old son were gravely injured. A fourth passenger suffered only minor injuries.

Jim Kennedy, about 65, of Deer Island, died in a head-on automobile crash on the lower Columbia river highway. Deputy Sheriff Lee Mollenhour reported. Four persons were slightly injured.

Gerard L. Lundie, 29, of Minneapolis was killed and his companion, Donald Fulk, 22, of Albany critically injured last night. Their automobile crashed into a ditch near Hinesville on the Highway-Sweethome highway.

Lillie Mae Jones, 16, of South Deer creek in Douglas county drowned in South Umpqua river last night when she stepped into a hole while wading and was carried away by the current.

Although it was a "safe and sane" Fourth as far as fireworks went, at least 128 persons met violent deaths throughout the country.

Only two fireworks fatalities were reported in an Associated Press survey, one in Colorado and one in Maine. At a Fourth North, Tex., fireworks display a section of boardwalk collapsed, plummeting 200 persons 15 feet, but none was killed; 40 were injured.

Automobile accidents accounted for at least 63 deaths and drowning for 35. The traffic toll thus was under the normal average of 75 estimated by the National Safety council for a Thursday in July. The council set the normal average for a July Friday at 85, Saturday 130 and Sunday 130.

At least three persons were killed by lightning—two in Colorado and one in Pennsylvania.

During his work as an instructor he has soloed more than 200 students. He recently was called to Seattle for two weeks of special training and re-rating in order to qualify as an instructor under the federal government's new civilian aviation training program.
