"America can truly be served and the principles of freedom and democracy perpetuated by developing future leaders among our young women who are mentally and spiritually equipped to participate actively in the affairs of government."

Ruth Ann reported that around the campfire the night of their arrival, Fred Smith Corbett told the group that theirs was one of 44 similar camps in the United States. There are five cabins and two leaders' cabins there. Ruth Ann said: "The whole camp was the state and each unit was a county which was divided into two cities."

"Did we campaign for our officer?" exclaimed Ruth Ann. "I was elected senator," she said, "and when we went to Salem for the opening of the capital I got to sit in Senator Clark's chair. We held real legislature in the senate and house. We went through the entire court and our chief justice got to sit in the chief's place. Our governor sat in the governor's chair in his office. We passed a bill in the senate chamber before we left. In camp was passed a great many bills. One of our trials was a breach of promise suit."

Governor Sprague spoke to the girls Wednesday. Mrs. Horsfall told the girls that their camp was much like the state camp held in California the girls met in a high school.

"Friday night each unit had to put on a skit," Ruth Ann said. "Our unit got the prize. It was a chocolate cake and we waited till lights were out and 'boy' was a good!"

The last day the girls went on a ten-mile hike and had a picnic taken of all government buildings. Pictures of the girls appeared in Portland and Salem papers.

Harriet Long, state historian, told the girls that today women are going out in the world and doing remarkable things. They can do what ever they undertake, she told them.

"Girls State," Dorothy McCullough Lee said, "is designed to be a practical working model of our government where the fundamentals of good citizenship are taught. The American Legion auxiliary feels that our democracy will be able to successfully withstand any impact of subversive influence if our youth realizes the close relationship between government and individual welfare."

"It is the hope," Senator Lee declared, "of the American Legion auxiliary that the girls state can make a real contribution in helping to develop intelligent, constructive leadership for the future."

Another year it is the hope of the Umpqua unit to be able to send several girls to Beaver State. The unit is as pleased as Ruth Ann over the outcome of this trial Beaver State.
