Tourist Trade In Oregon Decreases

SALEM, July 9.—(AP)—Despite predictions that 1940 would be a record tourist year for Oregon, tourist trade is 10.7 per cent below that of last year, Secretary of State Snell said today.

There were 47,222 out-of-state cars registered in Oregon during the first six months of 1940, compared with 53,914 in the first half of 1939. The June registration of 18,778 cars was 11.3 per cent under the June, 1939, registration.

The highway department's travel and information department expected a new record to be set this year, believing many persons who usually travel to Europe would come to the northwest.

A total of 25,184 California cars were registered in Oregon during the first half of 1940, compared with 24,475 from Washington, 1,958 from Idaho and 1,088 from Canada.

Ashland was the leading port of entry, registering 12,667 cars. Others included Cave City 5,425, Brookings 3,145, Grants Pass 2,719, Klamath Falls 2,137, Umatilla 2,043, Portland 1,791, Arlington 1,712, Medford 1,703, Bend 1,337, Eugene 1,251, Baker 723, Pendleton 715, Roseburg 1,006, Salem 490.

Oregon Hunting Rules to Be Fixed Saturday

Hunting regulations for the 1940 season will be formulated by the Oregon state game commission Saturday, July 13, at Portland. The meeting will be open to the general public.

All sportsmen's organizations in the state have been invited to send in recommendations to the commission, and the majority have done so.

Passing Prairie Chicken

At one time, before man exploited the range, Attwater prairie chickens were more than abundant in the Gulf coastal prairie section. Today, with more than 93 per cent of its former range depleted, the Attwater prairie chicken is on the verge of extinction. In Louisiana the birds are practically gone and only about 8,000 remain in a few widely scattered spots in Texas.

Taft Sees Peril In Stimson Naming

WASHINGTON, July 9.—(AP)—Senator Taft (R., Ohio), opposing confirmation of Henry L. Stimson as secretary of war, asserted in the senate today that President Roosevelt had "left himself clear" to advocate a declaration of war.

Taft said Stimson "advocates a policy which amounts to war" and would certainly lead to war, and declared that his appointment was of a pattern with other steps he said the administration was taking toward war.

As Taft concluded, Senator Nye (R., N. D.) arose to say that he agreed that the question involved in the appointments of Stimson and Col. Frank Knox, nominated for secretary of the navy, involved the issue of intervention or non-intervention in the European war. Knox's appointment was to be acted upon after the senate votes on Stimson.

Nye Under Inquiry. Senator Nye disclosed today that the federal bureau of investigation has been investigating him, because of an alleged personal tieup. Nye made the disclosure in confirming reports that the FBI had compiled a dossier about him and said that he would "have access to the report" as soon as he could visit the justice department.

The North Dakotan declined to go into any discussion of the matter until he could examine the bureau's files.

A close friend of Nye predicted that the federal bureau of investigation would find nothing in the matter.
