Pressure of Hand Tells Doctor of Suicidal Act

PORTLAND, July 10.—(AP)—The pressure of a dying man's hand told Dr. Joseph Heeman of a suicide today. Sheriff M. R. Calhoun of St. Helens found John Lennon, 35, with a deep cut on the left wrist and a fractured jaw. The officer first believed the man was a victim of a fight but there were no signs of a scuffle. He concluded Lennon cut his wrist and injured his jaw in the fall. Dr. Heeman of the state crime laboratory found Lennon unable to talk at a Portland hospital. By pressure on the doctor's hand indicating replies of "yes" or "no," Lennon admitted taking his own life. He is survived by his widow.

Thieves Imprison Postal Employee in Mail Sack

PORTLAND, July 10.—(AP)—Carl Krebs not only "held the sack" last night—he was in it. Krebs, attendant at the hospital pharmacy and postoffice substitution employee, told detectives two robbers pulled a mail sack over his head and stole an unchecked amount of money and narcotics.
