Cold Storage Turkey Holdings Show Increase

SAN FRANCISCO, July 15.—(AP)—Although consumption of turkeys was unusually heavy, cold storage holdings in the nation on July 1 were much greater than in recent years, the department of agriculture reported today.

Storage holdings totaled 36,739,000 pounds, more than double the volume in 1939 and the July 1 average of the past five years. The total dressed poultry holdings in the country amounted to 82,359,000 pounds, 22 per cent more than a year ago, and 43 per cent more than the July 1 average.
