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Canyonville Youth Drowned in Mine

GRANTS PASS, July 15.—(AP)—Tragedy struck at three points in Josephine county within a seven hour period Sunday night and Monday morning, one man shooting himself through the head, a second hanging himself, and the third dying in a mine accident, according to Coroner Virgil Hull.

The lifeless body of Arnold E. Hask, 29, of Canyonville, was pulled from a 53-foot mine shaft test hole at 4 a. m. at Placer Monday morning, one hour and 49 minutes after he had been overcome by gasoline fumes and apparently died by drowning in 13 feet of water. State Officer Lyle Harrell reported.

William Robinson, 68, was found hanging to a maple tree at 6:29 a. m. Monday, a rope noose around his neck, at his cabin in Holland, Coroner Hull reported. An inquest held on the spot found his death to have been suicide.

He left a note which said: "Everything is going wrong."

Samuel Daniel Hyatt, 73, near Merlin, left the bed of his wife at 11 p. m. Sunday, walked to the front porch and put a .32 revolver bullet through his head. Hull said.
