

Legion Juniors Hard at Practice

Revenge Sought in Wednesday Game for Defeat Suffered From Marshfield Team.

The Roseburg Legion Junior baseball team, from a 4 to 2 win over Marshfield, went through a hard workout yesterday in preparation for their encounter with the strong Marshfield team Wednesday afternoon.

The game to be played here against Marshfield, which holds two victories over the local team, will be played at 4:45 p. m. Wednesday at Finlay field. It had been planned to hold a twilight game, but due to other commitments for the field, it was necessary, Coach Hod Turner announced today to postpone the game for 4:45 p. m.

The Roseburg team dropped both ends of a doubleheader to the Coon Bay players recently, the defeat being due in part to a very high wind, which troubled the outfielders in handling fly balls.

Coach Turner was well pleased, he reports, with showing made at Marshfield and hopes the local team can play as well in Wednesday's game. The Roseburg team needs a victory in tomorrow's contest if it is to stay in the championship race. Roseburg has an opportunity, by winning Wednesday's game, and both ends of the doubleheader to be played here Sunday, against Marshfield to win the Southern Oregon district championship, but a loss by Marshfield would be a serious setback to any championship hopes.

This year's team, Coach Turner states, has greater potentialities than any chosen to represent this locality for several years. For the first time in several seasons the team has three pitchers available for duty, with Appleton, Cox and Dyer as the hurling staff. Cox, who runs the outfield pastures when not pitching, is rapidly developing into a long distance hitter. Picard, catcher, is declared to be one of the best prospects to be seen in many years, and, it is believed by fans who have seen him work, will be able to go a long way in baseball if given the right opportunity.

Rice, Davidson, Cummings, Adams, Cox and Appleton, are available for outfield positions, while Rice, Stephens, Baker and McNeill will hold down the infield spots.

Support Urged
The American Legion baseball committee, sponsoring junior baseball, urges as many fans as possible to turn out for the game Wednesday afternoon. While it is realized the time set for the game is not suitable for a great many fans, it is the only hour available. Attendance of fans is needed, both to give the team the needed moral support, but also to bolster the financial end of the baseball activity.

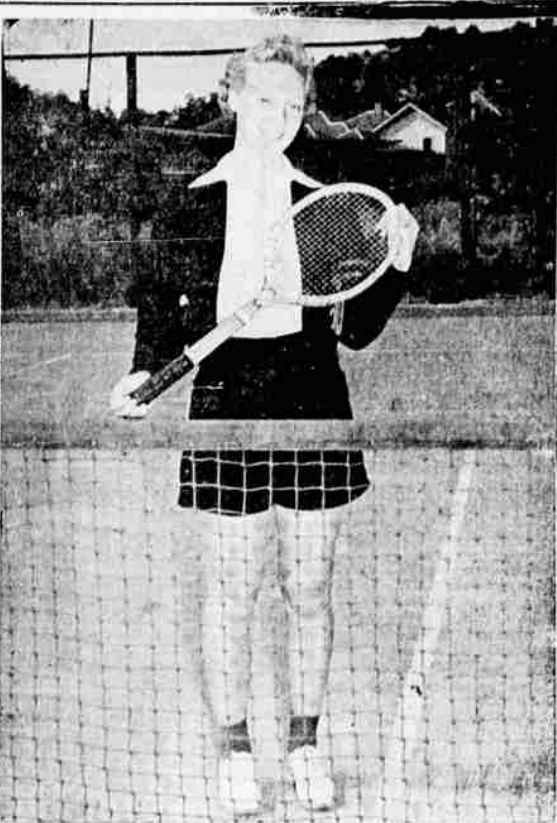

Man Who Hid Churchill In Mine in Boer War Dies

JOHANNESBURG, Union of South Africa, July 16.—(AP)—John George Howard, 87, who hid Winston Churchill in a mine pit for three days in 1899 after Britain's prime minister escaped from a prisoner's camp in the Boer war, died today. He helped Churchill flee by train to Portuguese territory, concealed in holes of wood.

Burma Route Ban Opposed by Hull

WASHINGTON, July 16.—(AP)—The state department announced today that United States opposition today to the closing of world trade arteries such as the Burma road and the French Indo-China railway over which China receives most of its war supplies.

Japan had demanded that Great Britain close the Burma route.

A statement from Secretary Hall said:

"The secretary of state in reply to inquiries by press correspondents for comment in regard to reports that at the instance of the Japanese government, the British government would prohibit temporarily the movement of certain commodities through Burma into China over what is known as the Burma route, said that this government has a legitimate interest in the keeping open of arteries of commerce in every part of the world and considers that action such as this, if taken, and such as was taken recently in relation to the Indo-China railway, would constitute unwarranted interpositions of obstacles to world trade."

ley highlighted the first major convention session last night.

Today's program sent the convention through the last whirl of formalities before the real action starts. Tomorrow's platform probably will be adopted, and Thursday will be nominating day.

As in the recent republican convention at Philadelphia, the knottiest problem was reconciling divergent views over foreign policy. The committee heard demands that the United States go so far as to convey supplies to Great Britain. Senators Wheeler of Montana and McFarlan of Nevada declared that to do so would be an act of war. They have said they would fight any proposal that strong, on the floor of the convention if necessary.

On the other hand, Senator Pepper of Florida was leading a demand for a plank advocating all possible aid short of war.

Bankhead Asks Unity

In his keynote address, Speaker Bankhead said the major objectives "of both parties must be unity and solidarity of purpose in preserving inviolate the altars of our government and the perpetual freedom of its people."

"We recognize that ours is a government by political parties and that as instrumentalities of government they are entitled to the largest measure of freedom in carrying legitimately disputed issues to the people," he said.

"We do not propose," he added, "to appease those aggressors whose doctrines were war upon every principle of liberty for a free people that our declaration of independence and our federal constitution reserved."

In this point, Farley said in his address, that the administration "has given its solemn pledge that no American boy will be sent to die on the battlefields of Europe and this compact will be kept."

Farley Gets Ovation

Farley was given a tumultuous ovation when he urged the party workers to "give our successors and the new national party organization the same support that was accorded to the national committee in 1932 and 1936."

The delegates already had been counseled by Mayor Edward J. Kelly in his welcoming speech to draft Roosevelt. But Kelly said the president always had turned aside his every suggestion that he run again.

Delegates in Quandary
Other leaders of states whose delegations are pledged solidly to Mr. Roosevelt for a third term said they had no more definite word from the white house than did Kelly. They had no instruc-

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Germans Ready to Hurl 600,000 Men at Britain

awaited storming of the island fortress was originally set for the night of July 9-10, but was delayed because of disagreement among Hitler's generals.

The naval ships were reported poised all along the channel coast from Brest, France, to Bergen, Norway.

Nazi Air Raids Lessen

Dienst Aus Deutschland, German commentary, said air raids thus far against England had not been on a large scale and were intended only to tighten Germany's attempted "starvation blockade" and to weaken resistance by destroying airbases, arms plants and docks.

The daily German raids on Britain tapered off sharply. Planes were sighted over northeast England but no bombs were dropped and a lone raider was believed shot down off the southeast coast.

The British for their part appeared to be striking at Germany. A dozen or more radio stations in Germany and German-held territory fell silent last night and early today, indicating that British planes were in the neighborhood, although no announcements were made at the time.

The British air ministry reported it had inflicted punishment on 22 German airports and other points in the previous 18 hours. The Germans called the raids "aimless" and scoffed at damage done.

Mines Ring Italy

Britain was believed to have laid new mine fields in waters around Italian territory in the Mediterranean. The admiral's navy warned vessels that if they should venture within 20 miles of Italian territory in the Mediterranean they would do so "at their own risk and peril." The move was stated to have been in retaliation for similar action taken by Italy against England.

Related reports of the big Italian-British naval battle in the Mediterranean on July 9 came from both sides today, giving new details.

A communiqué by the commander-in-chief of the British fleet said at least 20 Italian bombing planes were shot down in the action.

The Italian high command reported three direct bomb hits on the 42,000-ton British battle cruiser Hood, world's largest warship.

and one hit on the British aircraft carrier Ark Royal. Previous unofficial Italian claims to this effect have been officially denied by the British admiralty.

Holy Land Suffers
The Italian communiqué also reported huge fires set at Haifa, British oil port in Palestine, through direct hits by Italian bombers on oil refineries and depots yesterday.

Dispatches from Jerusalem said one Arab was killed and another seriously wounded in the attack by 10 Italian bombers on Haifa—the first air raid in the Holy Land since the war began.

The British admiralty acknowledged that the naziproclaimed "starvation blockade" submarine campaign against the British Isles caused the loss of 114,137 tons of allied and neutral merchant ships during the weekend of July 7.
