

Brooklyn's Loss Boosts Idle Cincy

Cleveland Again Defeated by Senators; Detroit Fails to Win Behind Hutchinson.

The Brooklyn Dodgers followed up in front of the Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday 5-3 and increased the Cincinnati's first place margin in the National league to 2 1/2 games. Brooklyn held a 3-0 lead up until the last half of the sixth when three doubles and a single chased Carlton and led to a 5-3 win. The Pirates fashioned two more runs in the eighth.

In the American league the only division club that didn't hit the dirt was Boston, whose Red Sox had an idle day.

Cleveland lost its third straight and the series to the west Washington Senators, who made four errors and still couldn't give the game back to the Indians. Washington scored seven times in the sixth inning when Doherty and Allen walked four men and Moyer and West each drove in two runs with singles while the bases were loaded.

The Detroit Tigers took a chance to regain the lead, but kicked it away, as they have so many other times, by bowing to the Philadelphia Athletics 3-1, but continued to hold a slim lead in the league race.

Fred Hutchinson, the \$75,000 pitching wonder of the Tigers, made his first start since returning from the minors and rendered a six-hitter, striking out six and walking none. But three of the hits coupled with one of two errors by Higgins gave the A's two runs in the third. Chapman added a homer in the eighth. In addition Caster led the Tigers to six hits with better spacing.

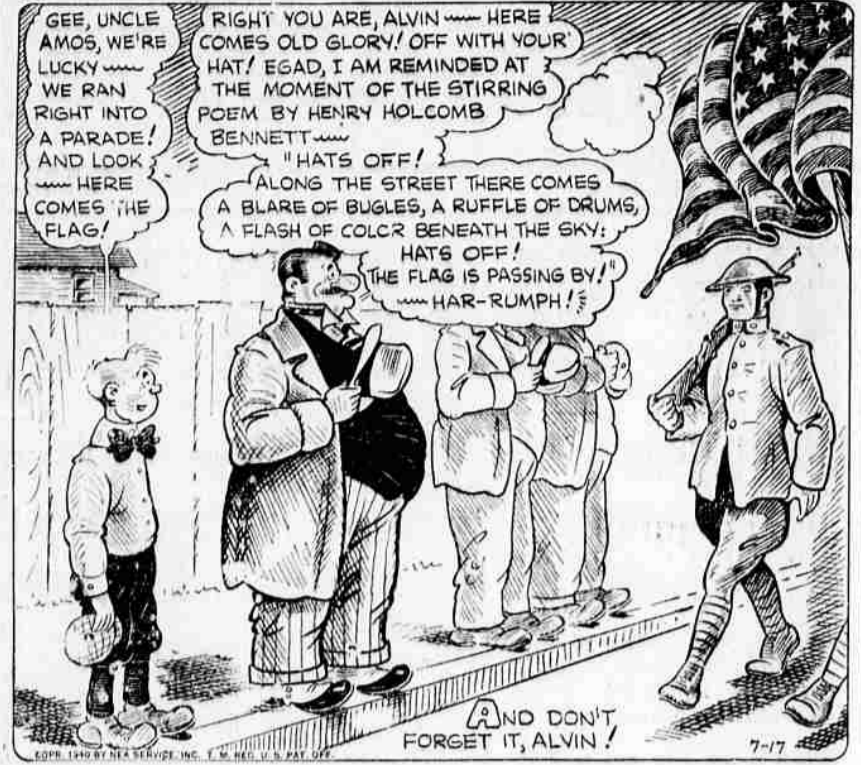
Hanes stopped the world champion New York Yankees again on six hits as the Chicago White Sox plastered Russo for an even dozen and the ball game, 5-1.
