Food Stamps Dispose of Surplus Oregon Products

PORTLAND, July 17.—(AP)—Relief clients spent more than 60 per cent of \$500,000 worth of surplus food stamps issued in Multnomah county for Oregon products, the department of agriculture revealed today.

From January 1 to June 10, before the addition of fresh vegetables to the surplus food list, Portland residents purchased \$75,000 worth of butter, \$74,000 worth of eggs, \$65,000 worth of graham flour, \$87,000 worth of white flour, \$19,000 worth of prunes and \$10,500 worth of apples. Part of the \$18,000 spent for pork and pork products was devoted to Oregon purchases.
