First 8-Inning Game Staged in

Dunham's Transformers eked out a 6-5 win over Hub's Indians last night in the first extra inning game of the City Softball League. With two men out in the last half of the eighth inning, Rice lined a looping single over second base. Rome Reports Blows

The Italian high command acknowledged today the loss of a submarine and reported the capture of Kressan in the region of Kurma in the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan.

The occupation of Moyale, British frontier post in Kenya, also was announced as well as the beating off of a heavy British attack on Italian positions north of Port Capuzzo in Libya.

The British previously had announced the withdrawal of their troops from Moyale.

In Libya, the Italian high command said, the British attacked with a strong force, including about 50 tanks, behind a smoke screen laid down as they advanced.

Further Italian air bombardment of Alexandria, Egypt, was reported in the high command's communique, along with the bombing of air fields and barracks in Marsa Matruh and Sidi Barrani, in Egypt near the Libyan frontier.

Two British planes were reported shot down in an air fight over Malta and another in raids on Ethiopian centers.

An Italian submarine sank a large oil tanker in the eastern Mediterranean, the communique said.

In addition to the loss of an Italian submarine, the high command reported that an Italian plane was missing after an air fight over Malta.

GERMANS SURE OF ABILITY TO CRUSH GREAT BRITAIN

BERLIN, July 17.—(AP)—Preparations for the offensive against Britain are almost completed, authorized German sources said today, but warned correspondents to refrain from speculation as to when or what the next move may be, declaring no one can forecast Adolf Hitler's actions and decisions.

Complete confidence in Nazi ability to crush England was reflected in the calmness with which the German people awaited a derivative test of strength which they believed may come at any minute.

The authoritative commentary Dienst Aus Deutschland, which only yesterday reported everything in readiness for a mass onslaught upon England, declared that the nation was awaiting Adolf Hitler's command to strike with a severity which permitted it to look beyond the final struggle to the task of establishing a new order in Europe.

Totalitarian Rule for Japan Formally Begun

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ish, French and Netherlands possessions in the Orient.

Powerful forces of the United States battle fleet, which steamed out of Pearl harbor, Hawaii, yesterday, were believed en route to "patrol" British and French islands in the South Pacific—the region eyed by Japan.

U. S. Opposes Road Closure

Both Churchill's government of Great Britain and the far east appraised Secretary Hull's declaration that the United States would disapprove Britain's closing the Burma road as a concession to Japan.

Hull said such action would be detrimental to foreign trade interests.

The Chinese government in Chungking said closing the road, over which it has been obtaining vital supplies, would violate international law.

Apology Demand Renewed

Three thousand Japanese residents in Shanghai held a mass meeting and urged Japanese military authorities to "demand" the "dramatic" of United States "marines" unless the marines apologize for the alleged mistreatment of Japanese gendarmes on July 7.

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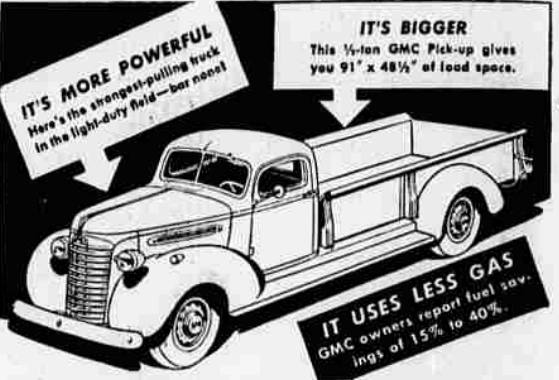
