George Evanoff, restaurant owner, said 25 pennies in Harris' possession represented the entire loot.

Oregon Home Guard Unit of 600 May Be Formed

SALEM, July 19.—(AP)—The war department's plans to create state "home guards" for local defense contingents raising a regiment of about 600 men in Oregon for that purpose, a military source said today.

With the entire Oregon national guard of 4,600 men scheduled for mobilization within the next few weeks, a regiment would be needed in event of civil disorders, the source said.

If the regiment of "home guards" would not be sufficient to cope with any disorder, Governor Charles A. Sprague immediately would be given federal troops.

When the national guard is mobilized, the governor no longer will have any control over it. The Oregon "home guards" probably will be recruited immediately after mobilization.

Control of Forest Fire In Lane Area Predicted

EUGENE, July 18.—(AP)—More than 120 confident fire fighters today battled a timber blaze which has blackened 200 acres near the scenic McKenzie river highway 42 miles east of here near Vida. They expect to control it tonight.
