

Detroit Seesaws Back to Top Spot

Tigers Down Boston in Eleven Frames as Cleveland Drops Its Fifth Straight Game.

The American league still is boiling over, like a pot of hot porridge, and there doesn't seem to be anything anyone can do about it.

The Cleveland Indians stumbled into their fifth consecutive defeat yesterday, 5-6, at the hands of the New York Yankees. Four bases got 'em into first place, but five took 'em out.

Both the Boston Red Sox and Detroit Tigers had a chance to scoot into the lead, but when they finished battling each other at the end of 11 wild innings, it was Detroit that was on top, 10-8.

Although they are in fourth place, the world champions are only four games behind the leaders. The amazing Washington Senators, who were in last place only last Sunday, chalked up their fifth triumph in a row with a 5-4 decision over the Chicago White Sox.

The streak to end all streaks, however, was the one the St. Louis Browns extended to 14 games, all losses, yesterday. This isn't a 100-0 record—but it is one more defeat than the Browns ever had suffered in succession before. The 10-3 victory that the Philadelphia Athletics took from them was a combination of five-hit hurling by Habich and a 17-hit assault on five St. Louis slingers.

The National league program was abbreviated to two games and the Brooklyn Dodgers made the most of the idleness of the Cincinnati Reds by whipping the Chicago Cubs 7-4 to narrow the gap between first and second place to three games.

Credit for the triumph went to Tamula, who blanked the Cubs for six innings on a hit after Chicago had got rough with Curt Davis in the third, when Nicholson and Leiber hit homers.

Hubbard got the chance he wanted to work in a night game and handicapped the Pittsburgh Pirates 6-1 on six hits, although his teammates on the New York Giants fell apart with five errors.

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Japan to Remain Friendly With U. S.

TOKYO, July 19.—(AP)—The inner government of the new Konoike cabinet reached a decision today on relations with Italy and Germany and informed quarters asserted that it calls for a closer working arrangement with the axis.

The question of whether the Netherlands East Indies and French Indo-China would be taken under "protection" still was unclarified.

It was considered certain that Japan first would attempt an understanding with Berlin on any action in the South seas.

Japan under her new totalitarian-type government will remain friendly with the United States but will not lean over backward to improve this friendship, it appeared today.

The foreign office spokesman, Yukihiro Suma, told a press conference that Japan's desire for friendship with the United States would not be decreased even though the new government strengthens relations with Germany and Italy.

"Politics are not maintained by mathematical formula," he said. "We are not friendly with all nations. We have been the party wanting better relations with the United States. We already have our cards on the table and have been waiting for six months for an American move."

U. of O. "Grad" In New Jap Cabinet

EUGENE, July 19.—(AP)—Although he never attended classes on the Eugene campus, friends of Youkio Matsukata, a University of Oregon graduate who has been elevated to the position of Japanese foreign minister in Prince Konoike's totalitarian cabinet, have followed his political activities with interest.

It was in March, 1933, when he returned to Nippon through the United States after he led Japan's dramatic exit from membership in the league of nations, that Matsukata made his first and only visit to the real soil of his alma mater.

He graduated from the Oregon law school in 1900 when it was still in Portland.

Tribute to "a very charming gentleman who is proud of his connection with the institution" was offered by James H. Gilbert, dean of the school of social science. He recalled the capacity crowd which jammed a campus hall to hear an address delivered in "perfect English" by the American educated statesman.

"Typically Yankee was the statement of Alumni Director Elmer Farnett. Speaking of the 'very outstanding alumnus,' he said 'he's a powerhouse.' In Japanese, Matsukata's name means 'walking dynamite.'"

"Unquestionably he is one of the most distinguished alumnus," said Earl W. Othman, who organized his assembly program in 1922. He is "a very able person," he declared, adding the belief and hope that Matsukata, a Japanese, "understands the American point of view" on the international scene.

Game Forfeited to Douglas Juniors

Coos Bay Players Adjudged at Fault in Tardiness That Contacted Darkness.

Forfeited of Wednesday's Legion Junior incomplete baseball game by Marshfield to Roseburg was ordered today by Bob Robinson, state Legion baseball chairman, after reviewing the facts which resulted in a bitter argument at Finlay field. The game was halted midway in the fifth inning, because of darkness. After the Marshfield team, scheduled to play at 4:45 o'clock, failed to start the contest until 6:20 o'clock, Roseburg played four innings under protest. Marshfield, in turn, protested the decision of Umpire Bill Schermer, halting the game because of darkness before completion of the fifth inning. Had the game gone the full five innings, it would have been scored as a complete game. Marshfield was leading 8 to 2, and Roseburg would have been eliminated from the district title. Halting the game before completion of the fifth inning, however, made it an incomplete game and therefore it is scored as no contest.

State Chairman Robinson, reporting today to Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly, district chairman, stated that under the circumstances Marshfield must forfeit the game to Roseburg.

He stated that he had conferred with experts on baseball rules and that the procedure in such cases is well established.
