"Sleeper" Fires Feared As Sequel to Storms

The Umpqua National forest service and the Douglas Forest Protective association were keeping a close watch on their respective areas today anticipating that "sleeper" fires may be discovered as a result of severe electric storms last night.

The forest service reported three fires started in the Diamond lake area and one in the Bohemia district. All were quickly extinguished and caused no damage. The county patrol reported three strikes in the Cow Creek district, but a rainfall amounting to about one half inch extinguished the storm and is believed to have extinguished any fires which may have been started.

However, lightning storms usually are followed by "sleeper" fires, which occasionally smolder for several days before becoming of sufficient size to permit discovery.

GUIDANCE TO RECREATION

Fishing prospects, highway and forest conditions summarized in week-end bulletin of the Umpqua National Forest.

Fishing: Fishing in the North Umpqua is reported to be the best in several years. Steelhead have been quite active the past few days all the way from Rock creek to Steamboat. Some are even venturing up the north river above Steamboat and are being taken in places which have not heretofore been considered steelhead water.

As for trout—the Utah rainbows are offering good sport in the North Umpqua, especially from Idlewild to the Honey creek rapids. Above Steamboat a considerable number of large trout from 12 to 18 inches in length have been taken the past few days. Flies, of course, are the accepted lure on the North Umpqua; however, it is more than mere rumor that some fish are brought to net with offerings of juley worm or fat green grasshopper.

From Fish lake in the South Umpqua district comes a report of limit catches of rainbow and eastern brook trout. Average size is about 10 inches with exceptional specimens running up to 14 or 15 inches. At Diamond lake the fishing is reported to be fair. Several catches have been made on flies and by so-called "blazer" fishing. Trolling has been dull. The lake is pleasant. Mosquitoes are receding, although some are still left. Diamond Lake lodge has been filled to capacity, and prospective recreationists should phone or write ahead for reservations.

All streams of the forest are extremely low for this time of year, being at a level not usually reached until late August. Stream fishing is reported only fair in the South Umpqua district, fair-to-good in the Diamond lake district, and poor in the Bohemia district. Roads: All roads in the forest are reported to be open, with the exception of the North Umpqua road above the new Marston bridge. The road from this point to Big Camas will be closed during work hours, but will be open Saturday and Sunday.

Huckleberries: A good crop of huckleberries is indicated for this season, with reports of loaded bushes coming from the various berry patches. The harvest should begin in about two weeks.

Fire Danger: The noted lack of late spring rains has set this season approximately thirty days ahead of the average year insofar as moisture content of the forest is concerned. This, of course, has resulted in extraordinary early fire danger. Thus far the Umpqua forest has fortunately escaped fire loss and every precaution is being taken to prevent the start and spread of fire. Eternal vigilance must be maintained. If you are a member of your match, your cigarette stub, your improperly extinguished campfire, may result in releasing a raging, red demon of destruction.

BOSTON, July 20.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "Rarely in the experience of this writer over many years has the wool market been less active than now, so far as new business is concerned. Considerable wool is arriving from the west for approval and warehouse and much is being billed out to the mills but new orders just don't exist. Many of the largest houses have sold nothing all week unless some little oddment which didn't typify the mar-

ket. Prices, however, are a bit softer.

"The coming western auctions may reveal the temper of the market more clearly than anything which has happened this week. "The piecegoods market still is disappointing. Further government orders may be forthcoming soon, however, to break the monotony. "Foreign wool offerings are less conspicuous and have little effect on the market here for the moment. "Mohair is dull, also, with prices hardly changed for the week."
