DETROIT scored four runs in the ninth inning to win the first game of a doubleheader yesterday, 4-3, and then captured the nightcap 3-2. It was a striking show in which 68,596 fans participated, stamping one of the worst exhibitions of rowdiness the Yankee stadium ever have witnessed.

The Cleveland Indians, who were crushed in their series at New York, completed a sweep of the Yankees 4-1 and 1-2 to make their score 2-0 in the last 25 games, certainly a championship pace.
