PORTLAND, July 22.—(AP)—A plunge down a chute at a Tualia river swimming resort ended in the death of Robert Herget, 22, and the narrow escape of his companion, Ben Miller, 21, early today.

Neither knew how to swim. Glenn McKilvin, 17, Portland, pulled Miller out of the river after he had been in five or six minutes. An hour of artificial respiration was required to restore him to consciousness.

His endorsement of a proposal originally made by Cuba constituted a further warning to Germany and Italy—already made in a formal note—that any attempt to acquire French, Dutch or British colonies in this hemisphere would be resisted first by the United States and, if supported by the other nations, would lead immediately to the establishment of a collective trusteeship over threatened territory.

The Germans admitted loss of five planes Saturday but said the British lost 22.
Also on the debit side, Britain reported the submarine Salomon was long overdue and given up for lost and that the mine-sweeping trawler Crestflower was sunk by enemy aircraft.
The Salomon last December 12 reported destruction of a German submarine, damaging of the German cruisers Blucher and Leipzig and letting the German liner Bremen pass because she was too distant for adequate warning.

the British reject a Nazi-prescribed peace, "my answer will be terrible for millions."

The German high command reported that waves of Nazi bombers set big fires at airbases, ports, factories and oil tanks in the island kingdom.

Dive-bombing planes assaulted a convoy in the English channel, the high command said, and sank a tanker and four merchant ships totalling 49,000 tons.

The high command acknowledged that British royal air force planes, raiding in the darkness over northern and western Germany, caused "some damage." It two destroyers were damaged in air raids Saturday and the important port of Newcastle and southern English industrial centers were heavily bombed.

Rumania Gets Soviet Hint.
Rumania was reported to have received a Russian "suggestion" that she form a "popular front" government—such as those established in the Baltic countries after the red army moved in.

Rumania's King Carol, who already has yielded to Russia the great area of Bessarabia and northern Buevian to avoid a fight, was reported to have asked Germany and Italy desperately to advise him in this latest dilemma.
