LADIES AID HAS MEETING THURSDAY

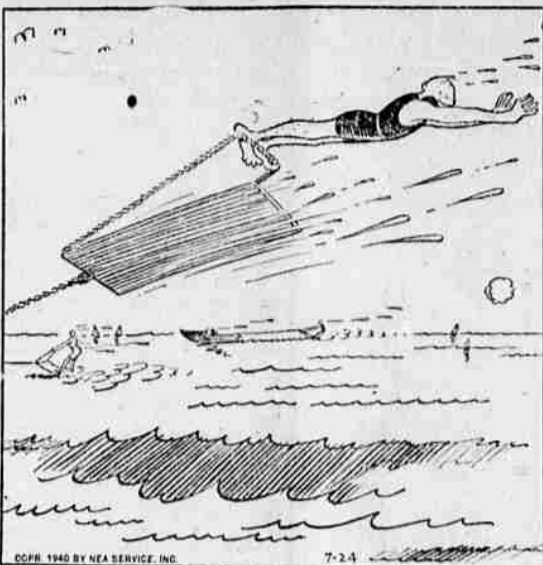
